



He would talk of slippery streets, and the sensations of falling on crue city cobblestones—the pressure of the load pushing him to the fall, the bruis-ed knees and wreached joints; the tightened straps and the feel of the driver's lash, the panting nostrils and heaving flanks, and the horrible fright of it all.
