## A Fine Collection

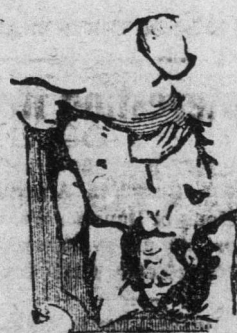
At the Roman Catholic Church, yesterday, a collection was taken up for the purpose of instituting an ecclesiastical seminary referred to in the Pastoral Letter of His Grace Archbishop Howley. Considering the season the collection was a liberal one. The congregations at the masses in the Cathedral donated \$1,053, at St. Patrick's \$470.93, at Kilbride \$76 and at Littledale \$10. When private subscriptions are added, no doubt the amount will reach \$1,700, if not more. This will form a substantial nucleus for the projected fund.

## Ice Covered.

The S. S. Othar, Capt. Sedgeman, arrived here Saturday evening from Bell Island. The ship's hull was thickly coated with ice, and she will lay up here until April month; the Euphrates in the meantime performing the Portugal-Cove-Bell Island mail service. Capt. Sedgeman says that from the time he left the western end of Bell Island, Saturday forenoon, until he reached Capt. St. Francis he saw no water. The whole bay is frozen over from Holyrood to the mouth and the ice is very tough. In some places well out the Bay the slob is pressed in and is 15 feet deep. The Othar had all she could do to get out the Bay and Capt. Sedgeman several times feared he would have to give up the idea and return to Bell Island. Only by persistent "baiting" did the ship reach clear water. Capt. Sedgeman and wife will reside at Portugal Cove until the Othar is again in commission.

## Walking From Wabana

Yesterday morning hundreds of men who are working at Bell Island took advantage of the ice in Conception Bay to walk to their homes to spend the day with their families. The ice was in some places nearly 2 feet thick. There is only a small strip of the Bay up near Harbour Main which is not ice covered and if the present frosty spurt continues this will soon be bridged over.

## Mission Fathers Here.

There arrived yesterday's express from Montreal Rev. Fathers McPhail, Holland, Brick and McAndish, Redemptorists, who will conduct a four weeks mission here, two weeks at the R. C. ## The Horse's Point of View.

**IN WINTER.**

If a horse could talk, he would have many things to say especially when winter comes.

He would tell his driver how a frosty bit stings and sears his lips and tongue when it is thrust into his mouth without being warmed first.

He would tell how it feels to have nothing but ice cold water to drink, when he is already shivering from the cold.

He would tell of the bitter wind that frosts his sides when he halts, steaming from exertion, and is tied for hours in an exposed place without a blanket.

He would talk of slippery streets, and the sensations of falling on cruel city cobblestones—the pressure of the load pushing him to the fall, the bruised knees and wrenched joints; the tightened straps and the feel of the driver's lash, the panting nostrils and heaving flanks, and the horrible fright of it all.

Yes, the horse would talk eloquently, if he had the power of speech. And having horse-sense, he would urge his driver, not merely for the sake of maintaining a faithful servant at the highest point of efficiency, to do these things:

Warm the bit before putting it in his mouth.

Warm his water up to a drinking temperature, if it is very cold.

Give him enough to eat, and spread plenty of clean bedding in his stall.

Put a blanket on him in the stable, on cold nights.

Do not let him stand in a cold wind without a blanket.

Keep him sharp-shod during the winter.

Drive him carefully over icy pavements.

When he falls, quickly loosen his harness and help him to rise, without blows.

Watch for the appearance of galls, and try to heal them before they grow worse.

Be human with your horse. Treat him as well as he treats you.

**A TEAM.**—Walsh, goal; Morison, point; G. Herder, cover; Joy, rover; Rennie, centre; Winter, left; Brien, right.

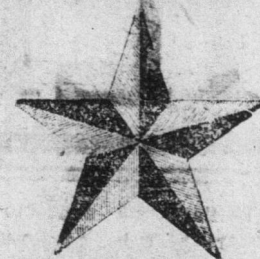
