### Capt. Marshall Drowned at Sea.

Messrs. Harvey & Co., Ltd., are in receipt of a message acquainting them that their schooner *Gay Gordon* had arrived at Oporto with a cargo of cod-fish from Belleoram, after a fine run of 22 days; also conveying the sad intelligence that Capt. J. Marshall had been drowned on the passage over. No particulars of the tragedy were received, though it is believed that he was washed overboard by a sea. Capt. Joseph Marshall was a native of Carbonear, a brother of Capt. Samuel Marshall, of Baine Johnstone & Co.'s bargt. Attila, and was married, his wife and several children residing in Belleoram where he removed 25 years ago. Deceased was about 40 years of age and a well known mariner.
