From this leader and that, we hear statements that the referendum principle has come to stay. Many radicals who are opposed to puchibition,-the question with which the referendum idea has been chiefly identified up to the present,-seem disposed to accept the method by which one wing of the prohibition party hope to attain their objects, as the true basis of all forms of legislation in the future. It is evident that progressive Canadians must be on the alert lest a loose yet oppressive system which tends to abolish the whole theory of responsible government creep into our practice.

The nose-counting principle under which, if generally applied, fifty-one per cent. of the people might dictate to the other forty-nine per cent., with regard to their liberies, habits, religious observations, private business and everything else with which a man comes in contact from the cradle to the grave, is wholly indefensible according to any theory on which the strong and successful nations have been built up. But it is precisely what the referendum means. By its application established theories as to the rights of minorities are wiped off the slate as obsolete, individual initiative becomes secondary or negligible, and leadership consists merely in keeping the ear to the ground and automatically acting on the fluctations of mass opinion. No young nation can make real progress under a theory which really means that one man's opinion is as good as another's on any conceivable question that may arise, and that if a sufficient number of noses point his way he may give them the force of law.-Saturday


