Electric Power Cut Off

WHEN AVALANCHE CARRIES AWAY FLUME-CITY LEFT IN

All electric power was cut off in the city at 6 a.m. on Wednesday when an avalanche of snow, over 100 feet in extent, fell over from the overhanging cliffs on to the wooden flume at Petty Harbor and carried away 75 feet of the structure. So great was the force of the avalanche that parts of the flume were carried over 300 feet away. As a consequence of this unfortunate mishap all the electric power coming to the city was immediately cut off. It was not, however, until late in the afternoon that the full force of the blow was felt by citizens. Beyond an occasional rumor-the day being a holiday and no papers issuedno one seemed to know anything about the accident except a very few, including those who wended their way, in spite of the storm, to the moving picture theatres. These latter people were informed upon reaching the various halls that owing to the electric power being cut off there would be no performances during that day Even then no one realised the full extent of the inconvenience until the owners were filled with dismay when

time came when lights were necessary. The great majority of houses in the city have electric light and the they discovered that their lights would not come on. A rush was generally made on nearby shops which happened to be open on the chance that candles might be kept there, whilst some of the more fortunate resurrected old lamps from damp and dusty eupboards. Confusion reigned supreme. A passer-by on our usually well lighted thoroughfares would have been shocked to see the difference be tween Wednesday night and the night preceding it. Not a light could be seen anywhere, save where, perhaps, in occasional windows the glimmer of an oil lamp or the faint flame of flickering candles would be seen.

Dame Rumour, as is usual under circumstances of this nature, was very busy during the afternoon and night and some pessimists were circulating the statement that it would take three months at least to repair

On Thursday morning the effects of the destruction of the flume were seen to he even more considerable than they were at first thought to be. First and probably most important of all there were no newspapers. Newspapers are, indeed, never appreciated at their true value until they fail to put in an appearance on the streets. Besides the loss of the papers, the reet railway was prevented from running, and all factories depending on electric power were also forced to

During Thursday morning citizens were brightened to some small extent by the knowledge that within the space of at the most, a week, everything would be alright again. Nevertheless, there was a raid by householders from all parts of the town on the hardware stores for the purpose of obtaining lamps, and people were even seen carrying oil cans on several of the city streets. Seldom, if ever has this city witnessed such scenes

as took place on that morning. Throughout the day rumours of all sorts were again rife, and to make matters worse no papers could be issued. On Friday, however, the Daily Star, by means of a 31/2 H.P. gas engine, managed to produce a paper on a small press at the Trade Review Office, whilst the Commercial Printng Co. of Theatre Hill issued a small news bulletin which makes rather an interesting journalistic souvenir.

Whilst all these things were going on in the city, preparations were being hurried at Petty Harbor for the fixing of the flume. Immediately after the accident occurred men were employed in clearing away the snow and wreckage in readiness for the repairing of the damage. All Wednesday night men were kept getting timber ready to be taken to the scene. At 3.35 p.m. Thursday, S. S. Sagona left port bound for Petty Harbor, taking 60 men and the necessary timber, and when she neared that place at 4.30 p.m. she was met by 12 motor boats which took off both men and cargo and brought them into the Harbor where teams, under the direction of Alan Williams, transported them to the scene of the accident. The men worked on the repairing of the flume until midnight when, tired out, they were forced to rest for a while. At daylight work was again started and with three shifts of men working, continued without a stop until all the necessary repairs were effected. By yesterday afternoon the work was successfully accomplished and last night the citizens had the satisfatcion of again having their houses lighted

with electricity. The men who were responsible for effecting the repairs to the flume, and especially the Superintendent, Mr. J. W. Morris, deserve great credit for accomplishing their task in so short
