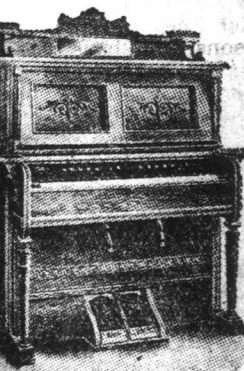

New York Welcomes Gallant Frenchman.

Gortram Surrenders to Little Man

THE DAY AFTER.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 28. A definite decision to hold the first session of the Conference on limitation of armaments on the morning of Saturday, Nov. 12, instead of Armistice Day, Nov. 11, was announced today at the State Department.

NEW YORK CAPITULATES.
NEW YORK, Oct. 28. New York surrendered to Marshal Foch to-day without striking a blow. Not since the Armistice has there been a demonstration on Broadway to compare in spontaneity or numbers with the reception accorded this afternoon to the conqueror of the German armies. From the Battery, where he was greeted by Governor Miller of New York State, to the City Hall, where he was welcomed by Mayor Hylan, the great little man, in horizon blue, moved in triumphal procession of many thousands. By his side rode General Pershing.

ITALIA REDENTA.
ROME, Oct. 29. Italy's unknown soldier was designated to-day. The ceremony was held in the Cathedral of Aquileia, near the Isonzo River, where Italian armies fought one of their greatest battles.

A WINNIPEG LAWYER'S OPINION.
WINNIPEG, Oct. 28. The contention that Newfoundland can have any claim upon Labrador was disputed to-night by Bram Thompson, Barrister of Regina and Editor of the Canadian Law Times. Mr. Thompson stated that Newfoundland had never been given any rights of ownership to any part of Labrador, but was "as a matter of administrative expediency given administrative control of the country." "He further stated that the whole Labrador rightly belongs to Quebec. The question will shortly come up before the Privy Council. Sir P. T. McGrath, Newfoundland statesman, is at present in the city looking into the archives of Hudson's Bay Company for information regarding the Labrador Boundary."

Dance Carnival to Be Repeated.

By numerous requests the C.C.C. Band have decided to run a second Dance Carnival in the Prince's Rink on Wednesday, November 9th. This one will out-class their first effort in every way, because quite a number refrained from going to the first because they were of the opinion that it would not be a success; others remained away on account of the bad weather, but the 1,700 people present on such a stormy night were well satisfied with the Band's first effort. The Rink was beautifully decorated, the selections, both Dance and Concert numbers were good, and the masqueraders present thoroughly enjoyed the night. It is predicted that there will be at least 500 masqueraders at the next one, and on this occasion four prizes will be given, one each for the lady and gentleman with the most original costume, and one each for the lady and gentleman with the prettiest costume. The decorations will be more elaborate; special music has been ordered from New York for the occasion, and everything points to a most enjoyable evening both for masqueraders and spectators. The prizes will be the same, \$100, numbered Reserved Seats 30c. You now have 12 days to get your costume, therefore do not have any regrets this time. The proceeds of both Carnivals go towards reducing the debt on the C.C.C. Hall, and the Band hopes to be entirely out of debt by the end of the year, possible, and they feel that the general public are behind them in their effort.

Will be Replayed.

The disputed football game between the Methodist College and Bishop Field College teams will be replayed. That is the decision of the Intercollegiate League. The dispute arose over a goal scored from a corner kick a fraction of a second after the whistle had blown for full time. As a result of this game should have considerable bearing on the championship and it will be therefore awaited with great interest by all concerned.

Schooners in Collision.

Yesterday evening the schooner Norman L., after entering the Narrows, got beached near Hay Cove. Shortly after the schooner Gordon S., under full sail, rounded the Heads and, before she could be brought up, fouled the Norman L., splitting the latter's mainmast from gaff to boom. Both vessels had to be towed to anchorage by tug boats.

LONDON, Oct. 29. To enable them to make fitting appearance at Washington, British Government women clerks attending the Disarmament Conference will receive a dress allowance of twenty-five pounds.

VERY UNLIKELY.
LONDON, Oct. 29. Chief among the demands presented at the Irish conference by Dail Eireann delegates is one that the six northern counties of Ireland shall come into united Ireland to accept the verdict of a plebiscite for fixing new boundaries, says the Star. Reference to Irish situation the Times says that in quarters that should reflect the mind of the British Government gloomy forebodings are current.

Who Is Holding Back Hewlett's Report?

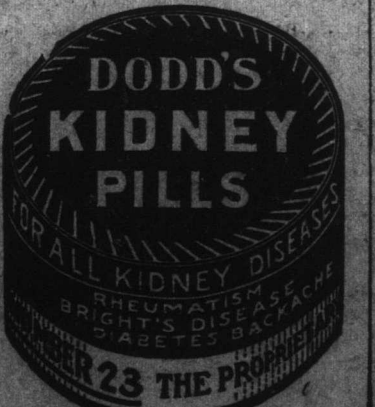
It is now some time since Mr. P. Hewlett has returned from Halifax and sent in his report on the herring which he was ordered there to inspect. Frequent requests have been made to have the report given to the public, but so far without success; and it is said that all the powers of the Board of Trade have not yet been able to get this document, although requested for on several occasions.

Of German Origin.

It is learned that the German fish appearing on the Oporto stock list was caught by German fishermen on the North Coast of Germany. It is also learned that the catch was not very large, and that competition from this quarter will not be very great, at least for this season.

Where the Lime Juice Comes From.

Nearly all the lime juice used in the world comes from the tiny island of Montserrat, in the British West Indies. The lime grows wild in many West Indian islands, but only in Montserrat is it used commercially. That island is one vast garden of lime trees, and nowhere in the world is there a finer sight than its thirty miles of orchards laden with the fruit of their time or fragrant with its blossoms. The fruit is gathered by negro women, who carry it down the hills to the shipping port in big baskets on their heads. Like all West Indians, they are remarkable for their ability to carry heavy weights in this manner. On one occasion the company which controls the lime juice industry sought to lighten the burden of its labourers by introducing wheelbarrows. The negroes filled the wheelbarrows readily enough, and then carried them on their heads as they had been used to carry the baskets. Many a negro woman will carry a hundredweight of limes on her head for a distance of a mile or more.
