It is very unwise to give children milk pudding after meat. When you take milk into the stomach it immediately curdles. If there is meat or fish withingts

reach, the milk clots upon it, becomes hard curd and prevents the digestion of either the meat or the milk. Milk should not be taken for at least

four hours after meat has been esten. There are other foods and drinks which, wholesome in themselves, may become almost poisonous when taken totgether. Bananas have a very high food value-greater indeed than almost any other fruit. But tea should never be taken at the same time, for with most people the mixture prevents their digestion. As for drinking spirits of any kind on top of bananas, the result may be really dangerous. Stout can be taken with oysters, but spirits should not be drunk with these shell fish. Whisky in particular, renders them most indigestible.
