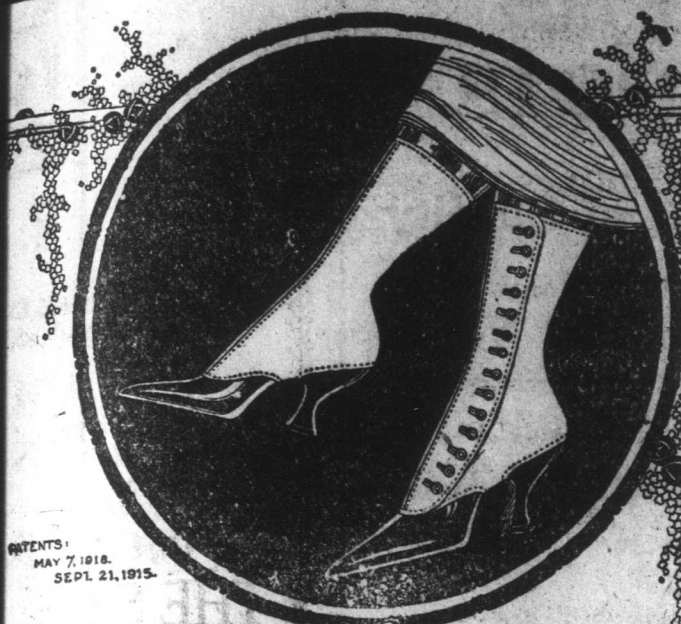

The fish's great flukes start to thrash the water like a ship's propeller, driving the little boat round and round in circles.

I glimpse over the side, my curiosity overcoming discretion. Suddenly, a thin black, flickering thing like a

whip licks across the boat. Out shoots the fisherman's right hand. "I hold my breath. Missed!" "If it touches you?" he shouts. "You are dead, for nothing can save you!" The thrashing continues. Again something strikes into the air. Like lightning his hand again shoots out. "Get a rope around it!" he thunders to the native boatman. "I have the whip." And, with water and foam flying in all directions, this is done.

With his free hand, he draws a gun from his belt and four bullets are fired through the brute's head. There is a frightful convulsion of the water and the boat is nearly overturned, but the steel grip never relaxes its hold upon the deadly tail. Seizing his opportunity, the boatman rises up and strikes with all his strength at the head with a log-wood club, and then at last, quietness prevailing, I breathe more freely.

Now I sit up and take in the full spectacle. There, two inches below where the fisherman grips the whip is the great fish's weapon of defence, fashioned like a saw, about fourteen inches in length, and set in the base of its long, rough tail. I shudder, for he knows that within a few minutes of it touching the flesh one dies in the most horrible convulsions. In fact, the boatman had actually witnessed a friend of his die a terrible death from one of these creatures.

The camera is now busy and ultimately the huge reptilian-looking fish is towed ashore to be weighed and more photographs taken. It would take much more space to give all the encounters I have witnessed with strange and fearful-looking fish, one of which was a colossal that took ten men all their strength to haul ashore—C. H. 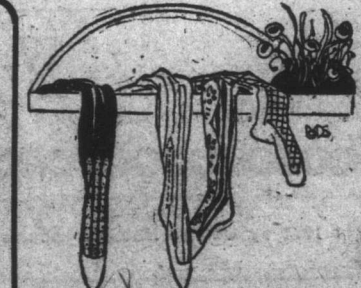
