Sealing News.

VIKING REPORTED IN MAIN PATCH.

S.S. Viking, the only ship procuring the Gulf Seal Fishery, has evidently reached the seals, a message to this effect having been received through Messrs. Reid Nfld. Co. this morning. The message stated that the Viking had struck the main patch, but the weather was too stormy to put the men on the ice. The news of the Viking during the past two weeks has been very discouraging, and the prospects of her securing a load looked for a time very gloomy. The Viking's position is not given, but it is presumed she struck the fat 73 miles S.E. 1-2 East of St. Paul's Island, from where 300 whitecoats were taken on Friday. It is to be hoped in the interest of all concerned that the weather will moderate, and that good news from the Gulf will be forthcoming by Monday. The sealing steamer on the Northern front have done very little since last report. All steamers report that a N.W. gale and blizzard was experienced on Thursday, but fortunately some of the men were on the ice, and all crews were reported on board and well.

The following are the messages received on Thursday and last night:

Terra Nova (Thursday)—Shot few bedlamers to-day; blowing a gale. On board and stowed 8,000. Ranger reports for 7,000.

Terra Nova (Friday)—Position 215 miles S.E. St. John's; ice tight, ship jammed. Ranger in same position. Nothing new to report.

Sagana (Thursday)—Position at 6 p.m. 200 miles S.E. St. John's. Total on board and stowed 11,000.

Sagana (Friday)—Position at 6 p.m. 210 miles S.E. St. John's, blowing a gale from West. Nothing new to report.

Eagle (Thursday)—Blowing a gale from Northwest; got 500 to-day; ice broken up.

Eagle (Friday)—Blowing gale from Northwest; ice tight; ship jammed.

Viking (Thursday)—80 miles E. E. St. Paul's, blowing a N.W. gale. Too thick to see far.

Viking (Friday)—75 miles S.E., half East St. Paul's. Struck small patch whitecoats; took 300 to-day.

Viking (Saturday)—Message to Reid Nfld. Co. to Bowling Bros. "Struck main patch to-day. Weather too stormy to put men on ice."

Neptune (Thursday)—Made good progress to-day. Position 205 miles S.E. by E. Cape Spear; ice tight as far as can be seen. Getting scattered seals.

Neptune (Friday)—Picking up scattered seals. Weather bad; ice tight as far as can be seen.

Thetis (Thursday)—Position 208 miles S.E. by S. Cape Spear, made fifteen miles to-day; now jammed.

Thetis (Friday)—25 miles S.E. by E. Cape Spear, practically jammed all day. All pans on board, total 12,000.

The Toll of the Storm.

FOURTH FATALITY REPORTED.

The loss of a fourth life as the result of Thursday's storm was reported in a message to-day from Magistrate Giovannetti, Trepansey. The victim is John T. Tobin. He is reported to have been drowned in Trepansey Harbor. Like the other victims, Mr. Tobin had gone with his alder to get a load of firewood and was overtaken by the storm. When he did not return home at nightfall, search parties were organized. The unfortunate man's slide was found near the railway station. It is presumed that he started to cross from the station to the lower coast, where his home was, and in doing so walked over the edge of the ice. The body has not been recovered.

MEN MISSING.

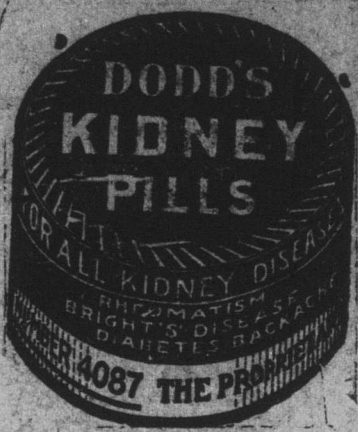
It is reported to the Department of Posts from Coombs' Cove, Fortune Bay, that Jacob Stoddley and Thomas Green of Red Cove, who left their homes on Thursday morning en route to English Harbor, have not been heard of since. Search parties are out looking for them.

Two young men, Rockwood and Wright, who left their homes near the Hopewalk on Thursday forenoon to go to the woods, were reported to the police yesterday evening as missing. A search party was being sent out when a phone message from the Hopewalk stated that they had turned up O.K.

Four men of Portugal Cove, T.B., who were reported missing yesterday, reached safety at Blisney Bay. The men had their hands, feet and faces badly frostbitten.

The Portia left this port for the westward on 17th February last, and is out from this port six weeks to-day.
