Salmon Pack Largest in Country's History

Revenue From Fishing Increases Yearly—Even Prairies Yield More

The largest salmon pack in the hisof nearly 5 per cent. in the total value of all products are some of the features of the fishing industry during 1924. Fishing is usually thought of as one of the minor industries, as it undoubtedly is, yet it represents the livelihood of a large number of men and is vielding a greater net revenue each year. The total yield of the industry in 1924 was \$44,534,235. With housands of miles of coastline and so large an area of inland waters, there is no reason why our fishing revenue should not continue to expand each

The prairie provinces are not usually thought of as a fishing ground, but Manitoba's revenue last year was \$1:232,563, and that of the three prairie provinces more than \$2,000,-00. This illustrates the fact that, with proper stocking, the inland waters of Canada may be expected to vield large quantities of food for many ears to come, a fact which brings the nterior of the country nearer to s elf-supprting basis.

The four chief commercial fishes in order of their marketed value are salmon, halibut, cod and lobsters. Their values respectively were: \$13,-784,920; \$5,878,870; \$5,443,814, and \$4.169,171. Of the principal kinds of fish marketed, salmon, cod, herring, mackerel, sardines, smelts, whitefish and pickerel all showed increases in value in comparison with the preceding year, while halibut, lobsters and haddock showed declines.

British Columbia, of course, stands far ahead of any of the provinces in the value of her fisheries. In fact "In Fast Company," the "Stars" are Richard Talmage, Mildred Harris, her total last year was approximately equivalent to that of all the others Sheldon Lewis, Jack Herrick and ombined, being \$21,257,567 against a grand total for all of \$44,534,235. Nova Scotia had second place, with \$8,777,251, and New Brunswick third with \$5,383,809. After these the order of importance was: Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba, Prince Edward Island, Sas-

katchewan, Alberta.
