on is a real service organization. It has ably carried on a great service for Canada, and there is still much to be done. Many handicapped men, mutilated and disabled veterans of the last war, and dependents of Canadian men who fell on the field of battle would have starved-so far as the government authorities are concerned—but for the intelligent work performed by the Dominion command of

It has been possible to perform this real service for the people of Canada because the men at the head of the because the men at the nead of the G.W.V.A., including the Dominion secretary, C. Grant MacNeil, have made themselves thoroughly familiar with the administration of measures that have been placed on the statute books relating to pensions, allow-ances and other provisions for meet ing Canada's obligations. The G.W.V.A. has acted as the soldiers advocate. It is the only organization in the country that has so maintained a national office in Ottawa, with the necessary qualifications for carrying on this adjustment service.

There is still much work to be done At the present time the active files of the G.W.VA. Dominion command in Ottawa contain 7,000 cases relating to former Canadian soldiers and de pendents in process of adjustment But the resignation of the whole staff of this capable organization has been placed in the hands of Sir Richard Turner, Dominion president of the G.W.V.A. They have taken this unselfish step in the interests of nation al unity. They are willing to efface themselves, if necessary, to help along the movement launched by Earl Haig last summer for the Canadian Legion

of the British Empire Service League Surely the public must appreciate the spirit of service which has been consistently displayed by the workers at the head of the G.W.V.A. But the public must also be concerned to see that there is no break in the continuity of that national work, particularly of the adjustment service Widows, orphans, dependents and dis whose cases are being dealt with by the G.W.V.A., would be left without an advocate. This service must be carried on until the Canadian Legion is ready to take it over.

In the meantime, the general officers associated with that new move ment ought to see that adequate arrangements are made for taking over the work of the soldiers' advocate which has been carried on with such singleness of purpose by the Domin-ion comand of the G.W.V.A.

Otherwise each child may go to the general store and select his own clothes. Each child is supplied a quart of nilk a day from the great dairy farm that occupies a place on the more than a thousand acres of land. The hospital is used as a preventive tool to which a child is sent at the first symptom of illness. These things com bined with regular hours and good substantial food, are health builde Mooseheart babies-Mooseheart child--do not die. They live-strong and rugged. Outside the gates of Mooseheart the child death rate is seventeen in a thousand anunally Within the gates a death in any year is a blot on the records. Goal-keepers pads—Maximum width
12 inches lying flat instead of 14. ouck back of the net.

New Defence Area-40 feet fro the end of the rink instead of 20 feet from the goal line. In this area the old rule applies, viz., no off-side for the Defending Team. All rinks must be marked with defense lines at each end, 40 feet from the end of the rink.

ONE BIG UNION HAS INNINGS

Halifax, N.S., Dec. 22.- The One of the United Mine Workers of America, operating in Pictou county, had its innings today before the royal commission investigating the coal industry of Nova Scotia. The case for the O.B.U. was presented by William Murray, secretary of the union, and once in use, one wonders how we lived concurred in by Robert Foster, Walter without them. William Murray charged that the U.M.W., which he characterized as a foreign organization, had come into Nova Scotia in 1919, and had undertaken to teach the miners how to conduct their affairs, including the burial of their dead. Under cross-examination of Sir Andrew Duncan, chairman of the commission, the witness detailed the alleged sins of the British Empire Steel corporation and the alleged sins of the U.M.W., who, in his opinion, contributed to the unrest throughout the Nova Scotia coal fields. He gave as his opinion that the wages at present paid the miners represented an increase of about 100 per cent over the wages paid in 1914, while at the same time the cost of living had increased by approximately 145 per cent. Under normal conditions, he testified, in answer to the chairman, the miner should be able to live better than in pre-war days. But, he contended, conditions were abnormal today owing to irregularity of employment

Victoria.-Dogs, which found friends n the Legislature when it was propos ed to give authority to shoot them if did not fare so well when amendments to the Sheep Protection Act came to be considered. These require all owners of dogs to take out licenses for them and authorize the killing of the animals if caught off the owner's pre-No dog shall be at large between sunset and sunrise unless accompanied by the owner or within reasonable call. The provision as to damages for loss inflicted on sheep by dogs is extended so that where it is impossible to reunknown, application may be made to months and the claim paid at the end of the calender year out of a dog tax fund to be created from the license fees.

"There seems to be no end to trical appliances for homes, and when electric helps is the fan to keep us cool in summer, but the fan or blower for the heating apparatus is now proving of more value, as it gives needed draft and consumes the coal much better

"We had all gotten into the idea hard coal, with its price going higher and higher every year, ad its ever-in-creasing volume of slate or near slate, was the only fuel we could burn. After we had shoveled this stuff into the furnace, we had nearly as large and heavy a crop of ashes as we had shov-eled coal into our heatisg plant. This ash heap had cost good money to fill our coal-bins and cost good money and hard work to get it out of our cellars, and is an added burden and expense to the cost of garbage collecting, as cities as well as persons have to pay for colecting and hauling ashes.

"Semihard coal or smokeless soft coal is much lower in price, and contains more heat units and burns up much better and does not leave on marter as much ashes as does the anthracite coal. Some kinds of hard coal keep fire better and longer than hard coal.

"A'ter a little experience in firmg, one learns to never cover up all the live fire, for this semihard coal does not give off any more smoke than hard coal if there is a chance for the open fire to consume the gases as they arise.
