JOHANNESBURG OCCUPIED.

British Field Marshal Will Make Victorious Entry at Noon.

Lord Roberts' Cavalry Is Now Said to Be Within Twenty Miles of Pretoria—Considered Possible for the British to Reach Pretoria by Friday—French's Cavalry Had Hard Fighting—Kruger's Personal Fear.

London, May 30.—(3.30 a. m.)—Lord Roberts is bivouacking in the suburbs of Johannesburg, and intends to make a victorious entry at noon to-day. Judging from his despatch he must have private information regarding the disposition of the garrison on the fort, as he does not seem to expect opposition.

Cavalry Beyond the Town. Lord Roberts' cavalry have flowed on beyond Johannesburg. A portion is understood to be at Zwartfontein, seven miles north of Johannesburg, and within 20 miles of Pretoria. Lord Roberts, although with a broken bridge at Vereeniging and a wrecked railway behind him, has somehow managed to get forward sufficient supplies for his large force.

In Pretoria on Friday. As he has been able to do so much, it is considered possible that he will be at Pretoria on Friday. The rapidity of his advance is thought an extraordinary achievement, even by grudging continental critics.

French Fought All Day. The Boers, who were expected to fight along the line of hills known as Klip Riversberg, abandoned the eastern end of the range, near Lord Roberts' advance line, but they stood their ground on the extreme right near Van Wyckarust, where they met Gen. French's turning movement. The fight continued all day, and the result is as yet mere conjecture. Probably the Boer rear guard succeeded in keeping Gen. French off, and is now in the hills northwest of Johannesburg.

IN JOHANNESBURG.

Lord Roberts Reports That He Will Be in the Home of the Uitlanders To-day (May 30).

London, May 30.—The following despatch has been received from Lord Roberts: 'Germiston, May 29. — (6.30 p. m.)—We received here this afternoon without being seriously opposed. No casualties, so far as I am aware, in the main column and not many. I trust in the cavalry and mounted infantry. The enemy did not expect us till tomorrow and had not therefore carried off all their rolling stock. We have possession of the junction connecting Johannesburg with Natal, Pretoria and Klerksdorp by railroads.

Johannesburg is reported quiet and no mines, I understand, have been injured. I shall summon the commandant in the morning and if, as I expect, there is no opposition, I propose to enter the town with all the troops at noon.'

Germiston is a suburb to the southeast of the Johannesburg railway junction, and Gen. Roberts mentions it in his message to the War Office, probably because Handsfontein station is further eastward. Additional evidence that the mines are intact comes in a message received by a mining company here yesterday from its Johannesburg representative, dated May 28, via Delagoa Bay, saying: 'All right, we have to do.'

Has the Town Been Mined? London, May 30.—Lord Roberts' despatch is regarded as announcing the virtual occupation of Johannesburg, and apparently the Boers have again effected a retreat, as there is no mention of any prisoners or captures, except of rolling stock. There will be some little anxiety pending the actual occupation of Johannesburg, as there are rumors that the town has been mined with the intention of blowing up Lord Roberts and his staff on their entry into the place.

Orange River State. Cape Town, Monday, May 28.—Lord Roberts yesterday announced to his troops the annexation of the Free State, which hereafter will be called the Orange River State. The Free State was formally annexed to-day.

British Guns Working. Newcastle, Natal, May 29.—The British guns at Ingogo have been heavily bombarding the Boer positions since daylight. The Boer guns have replied intermittently.

Boers Fled Early. Klip Riversberg, Transvaal, Monday, May 28.—The Boers, after preparing a good position, fled early. The train bearing their last detachment was nearly captured by Pilkington's West Australians. Prisoners taken state that there was no intention of blowing up the mines, declaring that the threat was made simply with the intention of frightening away the burghers.

STORIES FROM PRETORIA.

Kruger Decried May 27, 28 and 29 as Days of Prayer and Humiliation. Pretoria, Monday, May 28.—The British occupied Zwartust this morning, and a large force is marching on to Lichtenburg.

An official bulletin states that the British crossed the Vaal River Saturday. Gen. Lemmer had a severe fight at Klip River. Five of the burghers were wounded and two were captured. The British were 5,000 strong. By an order recently issued the President decreed that May 27 and the two following days be observed by the whole country as days of prayer, humiliation and the confession of sins, and that petitions should be offered for relief from oppression.

French Is Sharp Again. Cape Town, Monday, May 28.—

It is rumored here that Gen. French has cut the Boer communications between Veidberg and Boksburg, within a few miles of Johannesburg.

DEMONSTRATION IN LONDON.

People Cheered for Bobs—German Sailors Cheered for Kruger.

London, May 30.—The news that Lord Roberts was practically master of Johannesburg was received in London with noisy enthusiasm. A procession of students marched through the West End, cheering and singing. The announcement at the various places of amusement was followed by singing of the National Anthem and cheers for "Bobs."

While the townspeople at Fleetwood were cheering the announcement that Lord Roberts had occupied Johannesburg, the German crew of the Heureka, an English vessel that was sold to a German firm, cheered President Kruger. Several conflicts occurred between the Germans and the Heureka was mobbed. Ultimately the police force was doubled.

Kruger After His Own Safety. London, May 30.—Without doubt the presence of Lord Roberts with 40,000 men at Johannesburg, will hasten the Transvaal decision to sue for peace. Despatches from Lorenzo Marquez yesterday describes President Kruger "wavering, but demanding a guarantee that he will not be exported to St. Helena."

The fighting burghers still continue to desert and the total collapse of the Boer military organization is not far off.

SOUTH AFRICA POLICY.

Premier Lord Salisbury Says That the Boer Republics Will Be Made British Territory.

London, May 30.—Lord Salisbury, who was entertained at dinner last night by the Conservative Association, made an important announcement regarding the Government's South African policy. He said: "The stop-the-war party have used my name," said the Premier, "in support of their ideas by stating that I promised there should be no annexation of territory, no annexation of gold fields. I never gave the pledge. I never meant to give a pledge. [Loud cheers.]

A Simple Historical Fact. I stated a simple historical fact. We were accused of going to war for just of gold and territory. It was one of those atrocious calumnies which, under the favoring influence of Dr. Leyds, spread itself over the press of Europe. Nothing could be more untrue. We went to war to abate the oppression of the Queen's subjects in the Transvaal, and to secure the independence of the Queen's Government, to which, if the Queen's Government had submitted, her power, not only in South Africa, but in the colonies and dependencies, would have been at an end. We were forced into war by the action of our opponents.

Hiddenness Misconstrued. "To say that because we repudiated the greed of territory, we therefore bound ourselves never to annex any territory, is a most ridiculous and untrue statement. At this point, because this matter of annexation is about to become a burning question.

We have made a tremendous sacrifice of blood and treasure in this conflict. There are misleading prophets, whose action banks as large in the columns of the newspapers as the lion of the imperial and powerful people, who misled the unucky rulers of the Transvaal to continue resistance far beyond the time when all resistance has ceased to be even possibly successful.

No Boer Independence. "These men are perpetually pressing as to make some offer, some offer some arranged stipulation that shall leave a shred of independence to the two republics. Our only certainty of preventing a recurrence of this sort of war is to insure that never again shall such vast accumulations of armaments occur, and that not a shred of the former independence of the republics remain.

Never Again Such a War. "We are not at the end of the war, but I shall venture to lay it down as a primary condition of any future settlement, that precautions will be taken of such a character that such a war will never occur again. Of course, what measures will be necessary it is impossible at any moment to determine, because that depends largely upon the action and temper of those with whom we have to deal.

The Useless Resistance. "I have already intimated that their resistance has gone beyond the limit to which resistance could wisely go. It is not for us to criticise their actions in what they are pleased to call self-defence, but they have acted so that every bitterness created by the war and every severance of class or of races have been stunted by every measure they have taken; and so they go on.

Two Boys Drowned. Winnipeg, May 30.—Two boys named John Black and Bernard Gilbertson, both aged 12, sons of J. J. Black and Byron Gilbertson, were drowned yesterday while bathing in the Assiniboine River. The bodies have not yet been recovered.

Reduced to the Banks. Kingston, May 30.—Corp. Courtney, "A" Field Battery, charged with insubordination, declining to parade his men at the canteen or drinks on May 24th, was tried before Major Fages yesterday afternoon and reduced to the ranks.

Farmer Fell Dead. St. Thomas, Ont., May 30.—Joshiah Long, farmer of Union, one of the most respected residents of this district, fell dead while doing chores in his barn yesterday morning. Deceased was a native of Burford.

New York, May 30.—The re-hearing of the case of James Fitzharris and Joseph Mullet, the two Irish ex-convicts, who were excluded by the Board of Special Enquiry of the Barre Office last Sunday on their arrival from Ireland, was had yesterday. Judge Curtis' motion for the admission of the men was denied. Judge Curtis then gave notice that he would appeal against the decision of the board to the Secretary of the Treasury.

Reckless Rider Killed Lately. Buffalo, N.Y., May 30.—Mrs. Lydia C. Nelson, a widow, 66 years old, was run down and killed by a fast-riding, careless bicyclist, here yesterday. Mrs. Nelson was a native of Port Colborne, but came here about 20 years ago. Later in the morning the police arrested Henry Thendron on the charge of being responsible for the death.

Boers Leave Washington. Washington, May 30.—The three Boer envoys left Washington yesterday afternoon for a trip north. They will go first to New York, and thence to Boston.
