HASTY MARRIAGES.

Windsor Wedding Mill Feeds Detroit Divorce Mill.

The Detroit News, which has begun an investig tion of the subject, finds that in 1,404 divorce cases filed in the courts of Wayne county, from Jan. 1. 1900, to July of this year, a period of 18 months, hasty Windsor marriages contributed 193 cases, while Sandwich, Walkerville and one or two towns near the border added 41 additional, making 234

der added 41 additional, making 234 unhappy marriages contracted under the Windsor method, "Marry in haste, repent at leisure."

This is a little over 15 per cent. of the entire divorce business of Wayne county; approximately one in every six divorce cases filed.

Naturally many Detroiters are wedded across the river, and haste in these marriages often leads to the divorce court.
