FORTY PASSENCERS KILLED.

None of the Passengers or Crew Escape Unhurt.

A Train Plunges in the Darkness Into an Abyss Two Hundred Feet Deep.

STATESVILLE, N. C., Aug. 27.—A western bound passenger train on the Western North Carolina Railroad jumped a trestle near here this moraing about 2 o'clock. The train plunged in the darkness into an abyss 200 feet in depth, dashing the cars into splinters. At least 40 of the passengers were killed outright. The wounded number 25, and many of them will die. Few, if any, of the passengers or crew escaped unburt. Relief was promptly sent. Owing to the hour and the locality of the accident, only the most meager details have been received.

He read the message, called a doctor, explained the child's symptoms as his wife had actailed them in the message, and received the proper medicine. Then tying the little vial containing the medicine to the tail of the pigeon, he let it

The pigeon sped away through the air, straight for the Cliff. It made the distance of five miles in ten minutes—a distance which would have required the doctor three-

quarters of an hour to cover.

In twenty minutes from the time the mother's message was sent to her husband the baby was taking the medicine.
