Knocked Out—The Figures Conclusive.

It is a difficult matter to make figures interesting, and yet in the present contest figures are the conclusive argument. For years and years the Conservative party blamed the Reformers for hard times, and at the last general election held up a desolate picture of the hard times that would surely come if the Reformers obtained power. The people, however, held a different view, and placed the power in the hands of the Laurier Administration; and in this contest the Conservative arguments are answered before the contest begins. The figures knock them out.

These facts, taken from the bank returns for August, 1895 and 1900, show that the business of the country has made even greater progress than the people realize:

We say these facts answer the Opposition arguments before they make them. They are knocked out before the contest begins.

London should send a member to Ottawa who will assist in the continuance in power of those who have proven themselves so capable, whose policy in the conduct of government has made Canada a country prosperous at home and respected abroad.

Mr. Hyman, when elected, will bring to bear on the various questions coming up for consideration a well-balanced judgment. He can be safely trusted to do his part to continue and increase the progress and prosperity which the country now enjoys. In our issue of Saturday we showed that Conservative experts, surveying the prospects, did not expect the defeat of the Laurier Administration. It would indeed, be strange if the people defeated a Government under which they had received such splendid prosperity. The people will tell their opponents that they want "no change, and least of all such change as they would bring."

Canada's New Hold on Britain

Professor Drummond, a British expert, speaking of the British dairy trade, says:—

"Canada is making extraordinary efforts to supplant the Yankees in this trade, and is certain to succeed unless its rivals bestir themselves. Once the farmers of the United States led those of Canada in both the quality and quantity of dairy products; but today the situation is reversed, and the Canadians are constantly increasing their lead.

How Canada has increased her exports of these and other farm products in recent years is shown by the following statement of the value of our exports to Great Britain in the last three years of Conservative rule and the first three years of Liberal rule in Canada. The list includes butter, cheese, eggs, bacon, beef, hams, mutton, pork, apples, oats, peas, wheat, flour and potatoes. For these the figures were:

For the three years prior to the present Government taking office the total value of these exports to Britain amounted to \$85,000,000, and for the last three years under the preferential tariff \$161,000,000. In the last four years our export trade in farm products has increased 64 per cent, while the United States export trade increased only 47 per cent.

Our Government knew what it meant to the farmer, as well as the city producer, when it established preferential trade with the motherland, and turned the attention of the whole British population to the Dominion and its capacity to supply the wants of the British people.

The good work must not be stopped. The electors of Canada must not put it in the power of the Opposition to carry out its policy of repealing the tariff preference in favor of Great Britain.

It turns out that H. H. Cook's so-called manifesto was written by one of the Opposition campaign organizers, who arranged for its publication simultaneously the day after the dissolution. It is really a rebash of Opposition campaign literature, which Mr. Cook in his chagrin at not being able to get what he wanted, has been bad-tempered enough to sign. It is also asserted that the Opposition managers are promising Mr. Cook a senatorship for his aid. But it will be many a year and a day before they will be able to deliver the goods.

Significant Happenings.

There was a bye-election for the Legislature in Montreal on Saturday, and Hon. Mr. Gouin, the Liberal candidate, was elected by acclamation.

There was a similar bye-election in North Renfrew a month or two since, and the Liberal nominee was also returned without opposition in a constituency previously held by a Conservative.

There were three bye-elections in New Brunswick within the last month, and in each case the Liberal candidate won by increased majorities.

The tide is on the Liberal side this time. Their opponents will have to wait for a more favorable opportunity.

When has Canada been so prosperous or so well governed as she is today?

The people, when asked, as in the instances cited, say they are satisfied. They do not want a change.

The present Opposition had an inning of 18 years, and went out under a cloud. The cloud still rests over them, for they have not got rid of the men who caused it, and the country is in no humor to re-establish the old order of things.

Then and Now.

The Montreal Star is now lauding to the skies, the Tupper, father and son, Sir Adolphe Caron, Hon. Messrs. Montague, Haggart and Foster. These are the leaders of the Conservative party now, as they were in the summer of 1897. They have performed no penance since then; they have apologized for no past misdeeds. How come it, then, that the Montreal Star has now taken them to its bosom—even adding in the two-faced pamphlet No. 6 game—when on July 21, 1897, it was moved to print the following editorial opinion of them:

"There are some gentlemen prominent in the Conservative party who can do the party and the country a great service—by retiring into private life. Never did a political party so much deserve, never did a political party so much need, a beaming and Conservative party deserved and needed one at the time of the last federal election. The Conservatives were distrustful of each other, disloyal to their leaders, and among them were men who were quite right to distrust each other. Before long there must be a great reconstruction of the Conservative party, and the exigencies of the situation may as well be recognized at once. Some of the old leaders can never be leaders again, and now is the time to get rid of them. If the Conservative party is to command the respect and confidence of the country it must have leaders worthy of respect and confidence. The Conservative party need be in no hurry for office, the cold shades of opposition are having an excellent tonic effect; but some day, and perhaps when least expected, the country will need the old party's services, and need them badly, and it is important that by that time the party should be purified and reorganized. The reconstruction will involve not only the getting rid of some of the old leaders, but the selection of new ones, and it must be borne in mind that there are no Conservative provincial premiers available, so that there is no danger of Sir Wilfrid's blunder being repeated by Sir Charles. There are, however, plenty of men of character, principle and ability available, and the sooner their leadership is recognized the better for the party and for the country."

The Star editor and proprietor are the same as in 1897. The Conservative leaders thus invited to get out of business because they were unworthy of public confidence are still "in it"; the promised reconstruction has not taken place. But the Star man, swallowing his declarations of three years ago, praises without stint all and sundry. Has he, too, succumbed to the promise of honor and glory if he will say that those whom he characterized as black three years ago are now as the driven snow? It looks like it, and it goes a long way to discount all the Montreal opposition organ's attacks on the present Government and its supporters.

The Work of Malice.

The Woodstock Sentinel-Review interviewed Hon. James Sutherland when he arrived at the headquarters of his constituency the other day. Probably the most important of his utterances was in reference to the campaign slander concocted and persistently republished from day to day by the Toronto World, to the effect that Mr. Sutherland had written a letter to prominent Liberals to the effect that he himself, as well as other leaders of the Liberal party, were opposed to the bringing out of any more Catholics as candidates of the party, as they feared the anti-Catholic cry against the Liberals in Ontario. Questioned in reference to this matter, Mr. Sutherland replied as follows:

"No letter I ever wrote or any sentence of any letter I ever wrote could be in the slightest degree construed to give any foundation for the statements originated by the World that either myself or any leader of the Liberal party was opposed to Catholic candidates. The whole thing is a malicious fabrication, made out of whole cloth by the editor of the World. In an interview with the editor of the World in Toronto this week I told him just as I have told you, and more, for I told him he knew it was a fabrication when he wrote it. The World has not had the manliness to publish my denial; but I am not surprised, as it is only in keeping with the policy of misrepresentation and slander the Conservative leaders and papers have adopted throughout this campaign. I suppose for the want of something better to talk and write about."

The Voter's Opportunity.

The election is now upon us, the candidates are in most cases chosen, the campaign has passed into its last stage, and soon we shall face the decisive hour. The Government has lived its life and made its record, a record of which there is no need to be ashamed. The members of Parliament have attended to their duties with varied degrees of diligence and ability and must now give an account of their stewardship, and now the ordinary voter, who for four years has been an interested spectator of the country's life, must act the part of judge and give his vote under a sense of responsibility.

There are two parties and two great issues to be voted on, and each intelligent man should do his duty. There should be no neutrals—to be neutral is to be lacking in a sense of public duty, and to treat lightly a privilege that was only won by stern conflict. But there ought to be many independent men—that is, men who have no personal interest of a direct or selfish kind, but who are prepared to vote on the merits of the questions submitted.

We believe that the Liberal party can with confidence appeal to such, as it is a strong party, under a capable leader, with a clear policy and an honorable record. It is no small thing to guide successfully the affairs of a great country, to harmonize apparently conflicting interests, and to lead varied classes to work together for the good of the country and in sympathy with the empire.

At home we have had prosperity during the rule of the Laurier Government. The ruin that was prophesied has been conspicuous by its absence. There has been no unnatural inflation, but a steady progress, the signs of healthy commercial activity were never more real. Abroad the prestige of Canada has been tremendously increased. Canada never before cut such a figure in the eyes of the empire and of the world. Canada has clearly advanced a step on the line of its natural development. It has stood before the world as a free, self-governing nation, and as a willing and useful partner in great imperial enterprises.

To reject the Laurier Government at this stage of the proceedings would be to reject the noblest ideal that Canada has ever had before her. We do not for one moment undervalue all that has been done by Canadian statesmen of all parties in the past, but we do maintain that the present Government have carried their labors to a logical and successful issue, and that is all any Government can do. They have been faithful to the best traditions of the past, while they have discerned clearly and handled wisely the needs and opportunities of the present.

The voter has now the opportunity of giving them his support, and so taking his share in their great work.

Balanced Accounts.

Mr. H. H. Cook is giving his support to the Opposition because the present Government did not find it in the public interest to gratify his ambitions.

Many hundreds of former Conservatives are supporting the Administration because they find it much to be preferred to the unstable men who express desire to tear the tariff to pieces, advancing it or lowering it, as those affected are willing to bow down and serve them.

The balance of trade as between Mr. Cook and these hundreds of independent men who formerly supported the Opposition is decidedly with the latter.

Will Resent at the Polls.
