# Gory Stories From Shanghai

Rivers of Blood Inside the Forts at Taku.

Incredible Tales of the Murder of the Emperor and Suicide of the Dowager Empress-Less Sensational Reports Say the British Admiral Has Reached Pekin and That the Legations Are Safe-Rebellion Spreading

Far and Wide.

London, Thursday, June 21, 3:50 a.m. guarded by the troops of Gen. Nich. -The latest story sent out by the Shanghai gossips is that Prince Tuan, president of the Tsung Li Yamen, has burned the imperial palace at Pekin and murdered the emperor, and that the empress dowager has com-

The effect of the bombardment of the Taku forts, as described by the Shanghai correspondent, was gory in the extreme-nothing less than "rivers of blood" and "mutilated corpses" piled up inside the forts. The Russians guarding Tien Tsin, according to another report, fired artillery and rifles on June 15, at a range of 50 vards, into dense crowds of attacking

Boxers, and killed 300. THE LEGATIONS SAFE. The reports of Admiral Seymour's arrival at Pekin and of the safety of the foreign legations, originating from Chinese sources and cabled to this city from Shanghai, are still unverified. However, the Italian consul at Shanghai has wired to the Italian foreign minister, Marquis Visconti-Venosta, that the legations are safe. The rebellion is spreading far and wide. There is an impression in dipand on the tinent that the allies have not yet grappled with the situation effectively and that even 50,000 troops would be powerless to do much to control 4,000,-000 square miles.

SEYMOUR'S MARCH. A news agency dispatch from Shanghai, dated June 20, says: "After an arduous march and frequent fighting with the Chinese, Vice-Admiral Seymour arrived at Pekin on Sunday afternoon. On five occasions the Chinese attacked the column in great force. There were many mounted men among the Chinese, but most of the natives were badly armed. For Wheat This Year-Advance of 14 Cents in Two Weeks.

New York, June 21.-The bulls again obtained control of the wheat market yesterday morning and squeezed shorts to the extent practically of 2 cents a bushel, July selling up to 83%c before the regular opening, and from 83%c to 83%c after the official start. Bad crop news, together with unexpected strong English cables, were the principal arguments in favor of advancing prices. Operations during the forenoon reached a total of 5,000,000 bushels. Speculative excitement continued throughout the entire afternoon, with a strong advance, July selling up to 86c near the close, representing 4c advance for the day and 14c advance in the last two weeks. The December option was even stronger, showing 41/2c net advance. The market closed in a burst of evcitement at the top notch for the session and year. Transactions altogether amounted to about 7,000,000 bushels.

# DOMINION **PARLIAMENT**

Mr. Clancy's Motion to Strike Off Five-Cent Duty on Tobacco Discussed in the House-The Emergency Ration Investiga-

Ottawa, June 20 .- After spending the greater part of the afternoon in discussing an amendment by Mr. Clancy advocating the abolition of the excise duty of 5 cents per pound on Canadian leaf tobacco, which was voted down by a majority of 30, the house went into committee of supply and

passed a large number of items. In reply to a complaint by Mr. Monk about the difficulty in obtaining news of Canadian soldiers at the front, the minister of militia explained that every item of information the war office had about the Canadian contingents was sent here promptly, and in addition the department had frequent reports from Lieut.-Col. Otter. The department had done everything in its power to obtain information about the wounded. He himself had not had word, direct or indirect, from his son since April 14, and a great many other parents were in the same posi-

tion. On motion to go into supply, Mr. Clancy moved an amendment favoring the removal of 5 cents a pound on Canadian leaf tobacco. He argued that the removal of this excise duty would give an additional encouragement to the native tobacco-growing industry and would reduce the taxation on the people without reducing the

duty on foreign tobacco.

Mr. Fielding said that if there had occasionally been a complaint regarding the tobacco duties he had never heard before a complaint in the terms of this resolution. It was proceeding on a line entirely at variance with every complaint, and the adoption of this resolution would not in the smallest degree lessen the objection to the duties on tobacco. At the time the new tariff was introduced there were many reductions in taxation, and owing to uncertainty as to the exact effect of this lowering of the rate of taxation it was necessary to make provision that there should be no falling off in the revenue, and it was felt that in order to make provision for this one of the best ways would be an increase in the duties on tobacco, and he was glad to see that the increased duties had acted well and that they had collected a very large amount of increased revenue as a result of the increased duties on tobacco, and there had also been a very large increase in the native tobacco industry under that policy. This resolu-tion proposed to go further and give cism today, it was that the discrimination between the foreign and native tobacco was so much, and to carry this resolution would simply reduce the excise duty on the native tobacco and would not change the duty at all on the foreign tobacco, which was used by a large number of our people. While it might become necessary to make general reductions all round, to single out tobacco at the present time and say that that was the particular article upon which there must be reduction was not advisable. In the main, the tariff change was necessary, about the last item would be that on which a reduction in excise duty was now suggested. To add to the encouragement of the tobacco industry by simply taking off the small excise duty of 5 cents on Cana-

dian leaf would be simply giving something more to the Canadian industry it did not require. Sir Wilfrid Laurier said Mr. Clancy's amendment was calculated to destroy the policy under which great progress had been made. It was only necessary
