WILL NOT ADOPT THE UNION LABEL

Board of Education Does Not Favor the Idea.

PICNIC COMMITTEES NAMED

Consummation of Peace To Be Celebrated by All School Children of the City.

The board of education met last night in the council chamber of the city hall. A number of matters were brought up, chief of which was the drafting of committees for the school picnic and peace celebration at Springbank on June 13.

Principal Latta, of the Co-borne street school, petitioned for leave of absence on June 26, as he purposed going to England. His request was granted and Miss Yates was appointed to take charge of his classes for the remaining days of the term. Mr. Edward Wyatt was appointed principal's assistant for the next model school term.

A request, signed by about a dozen persons, was read, that the boys be permitted to play baseball in the northeast portion of the Collegiate Institute grounds after 6 o'clock on summer evenings. As objection had been raised to the noise incident to a game of baseball, the board referred the matter to No. 2 committee to settle.

Principal Radcliffe's report in regard to the attendance at the Collegiate Institute was as follows: General attendance, total number enrolled, 467; average attendance, 434. The number enrolled in the commercial department was 27; the average attendance, 21.

The standing committees' reports regarding payment of accounts were adopted.

The thanks of the board were tendered Col. Peters for his valuable suggestions in regard to the school cadets. Col. Peters emphasized the importance of rifle practice, which British experience in South Africa had proven to be the essential of good soldiery.

THE SCHOOL PICNIC.

The following motion was carried, namely, that a union picnic of the public schools of London, including the Collegiate Institute, friends and parents of the pupils, be held at Springbank, on Friday, June 13, and that the chairman proclaim the said day a holiday from 10 a.m. the teachers to accompany their children to Springbank.

The various committees for the completion of plans for the day's outing were drafted as follows:

Entertainment Committee—Trustees MacRobert, Hamilton, Strong, Gammage, Evans, Dromgole and Secretary McElheran.

Committee on Sports—Trustees Gillean, Macpherson, Colerick, MacRobert, Hamilton, Strong, Gammage, Evans, Dromgole, Blackwell and Secretary McElheran.

Committee on Refreshments—Trustees MacRobert, Hamilton, Strong, Gammage, Evans, Dromgole, Blackwell and Secretary McElheran.

On motion, the sum of \$100 was set aside to provide music for the day.

An invitation was issued to the separate school board and schools of the city to join in the picnic. Trustee Dromgole was directed to convey the invitation, and if it was accepted, to request, on behalf of the board a deputization to be sent to the sports and entertainment committee.

At the conclusion of the picnic arrangements, Trustee McLean brought forward a motion in regard to placing the label of the Typographical Union upon all printing done under the authority of the board of education, and that all advertisements for tenders should call for bids from offices employing the required number of union men. The matter caused some discussion, it being found that of seven printing offices in the city engaged at job work, only two of them employed the required number of union men.

Principal Radcliffe drew the attention of members of the educational board to the instruction in domestic science, which was begun about three months ago in the Norman School by

Miss Butchart. He asked them to consider the advisability of continuing the work. He was pleased with the progress that had been made. The course of instruction had also been satisfactory from the parents' viewpoint, as their daughters took a great interest in the work of the home. The following members of the board were present: Trustees C. J. McCormick (chairman), MacRobert, McLean, Dromgole, Evans, Gammage, Blackwell, Teasdale, Colerick, Hamilton, Birtwell, Macpherson, Gillean and Strong; Principal Radcliffe, Inspector Carson and Architect Matthews.

PASTOR PREACHER ON THE STREETS

His Cleveland Congregation Greatly Surprised.

IS UPHELD BY THE MAYOR

Rev. C. A. Eaton, of Rockefeller's Church, Formerly of Toronto, Follows Christ's Example.

According to the Detroit Free Press, the Rev. Charles A. Eaton, formerly pastor of the Bloor Street Baptist Church, Toronto, has been achieving a certain distinction in Cleveland, Ohio, by preaching on the streets. Mr. Eaton is fairly well known in London. The Free Press goes on to say:

The aristocratic and wealthy congregation of John D. Rockefeller's Cleveland Church, the Euclid Avenue Baptist, are all agog over the strange action of the pastor, Rev. Dr. Charles A. Eaton, who has been preaching upon the street. Some approve, a few condemn, but the majority are waiting for a sign from Rockefeller, who has already given the church \$1,500,000, and whose slightest word is law in this congregation.

Dr. Eaton took the first step six weeks ago, when, from the pulpit and to one of the richest congregations, probably, in the world, he said:

"DR. EATON'S DECLARATION.

"People no longer go to the church. The church must go to them. Christ went out into the highways and byways and preached to the multitude. Are we, his ministers, better than the Master? I have felt for some time that, in this city, there is a need of our work. Here in Cleveland, with a population of 400,000 souls, scarcely 100,000 ever go to church and only 50,000 are Protestants. We must reach these other 300,000. There is only one way to go to them. So, dear friends, I propose to go out upon the streets and preach Jesus Christ. The Salvation Army has the only right idea. I shall preach twice every week upon the public square, at noon time, and I believe I will do more good there than have in my own church. I want to take my congregation into my confidence, that they may replace me, if they do not approve of my course."

Dr. Eaton's hearers were agog. And when it is remembered that his salary is \$10,000 a year, his church one of the finest in the West, and that a palatial home goes with the salary, his congregation's astonishment need not be wondered at. The trustees at once decided that Dr. Eaton was in poor health. He was, and they sent him to the mountains for a few weeks. He returned vastly improved, and more determined than ever to follow the unusual course mapped out.

PREACHING TO THE MULTITUDE.

His first street sermon was delivered a week ago last Friday, just at noon. The square in Cleveland is the center of the business district, and only one block from the Tondelion. Every car in the city passes through it, and at noon on Friday it was traversed by thousands. Accompanied by a young man with a cornet, Dr. Eaton, who is a tall, earnest, ascetic-looking young man, took up his stand on a busy corner, opposite the fountain of the new government building. The strains of the cornet soon attracted a crowd, and Dr. Eaton, stepping on his pulpit—a soap box—began to speak.

"I am going to preach to you the same sermon I preached to my congregation last Sunday," he said. "It is on Religion in the Home. When I came here from Toronto, people told me that Clevelanders didn't want religion. They said if I announced that I would preach in my night shirt or talk politics from the pulpit, I would be popular. But they were wrong. I have simply preached religion and filled my church. Still, I don't reach the people I want to preach to. I want to reach you men."

By this time the hundred or so workmen on the federal building had dropped their dinner pails and were pushing over to hear what "Rockefeller's \$10,000 a year preacher" had to say. They came out of curiosity, but they remained to listen to the splendid, earnest, heartfelt words that rushed from the speaker's lips. And when he had finished, they crowded around him to grasp his hand, while nearly everyone of them said, "Come again, sir; we like to hear you."

MAYOR TOM APPROVED.

Dr. Eaton spoke the next day, but he planted his soap box this time in front of the Society for Savings building, the big bank of which Myron T. Harlick, the friend of McKimley and Roosevelt, is president. The agent of the building objected because the square was the park system of Cleveland, and demanded a permit. Mayor Tom, as Mayor Tom L. Johnson is familiarly known, was passing. Stopping his automobile, he ordered the park policeman to desist, and, grasping Dr. Eaton's hand, said:

"You may preach here or anywhere else any time, day or night, you wish, and I'm coming to hear you, whenever you speak."

After that there was no trouble, and Mayor Tom is a regular attendant.

REACHES MANY CLASSES.

Dr. Eaton's street congregations are made up largely of men. They come from all walks of life. The courthouse is only a few blocks away, and lawyers and judges by the score listen eagerly to his words. From the city hall, nearby, too, come politicians and officials. Drivers of drays and wagons stop their horses to listen to the sermon. Business men on their way to lunch hesitate to look at their watches,

and become interested auditors. Typewriter girls and cloak models from the big factories linger on the outskirts, while even the denizens of the tenderloin, attracted by the throng, stop to hear what this kindly-faced, intellectual-looking, sympathetic-looking man has to say.

Dr. Eaton doesn't believe in the old "hell fire and brimstone" sermons. He tells his hearers that every man is at heart religious, that the very fact that they stop to listen to him proves it. He describes the consolation religion gives a man in adversity and urges them to become a religious and moral force in the world by uniting with some church.

Once, when he told of his little daughter's sickness and death and described how he sat by her bedside through the long hours of the night, watching her breathing grow fainter and fainter, knowing that with the first gray streaks of dawn it would cease altogether, more than one rough hand brushed away suspicious moisture from eyes that seldom knew tears. And his hearers, as they listened to his story of the consolation religion had brought him in that hour, knew that they listened to a man who had gone down into the fire of temptation and suffering and came out purified.

That John D. Rockefeller approves of his minister's course may be inferred from a letter written Dr. Eaton last week, in which the Standard Oil king asked how much it would cost to erect a neat downtown institutional church, such as Dr. Eaton hopes one

day to build, and the minister's reply was: "Five hundred thousand dollars." Rockefeller's local representative says that John D. Rockefeller will probably give the money to build it, as he has already set aside the site, Euclid avenue and Browne street, in the heart of the boarding house district.
