DOUBLE MURDER AT RODNEY WAS ONLY AVERTED BY MIRACLE

Slayer of Eliza Lowery About to Kill Mrs. Covell When He Was Frightened by a Noise in an Adjoining Room.

Shocking Details of the Murder Related by Intended Victim at the Inquest.

Miss Lowery Made a Brave Fight for Her Life and Honor Minute Description Secured of the Murderer-Mrs. Covell Could Not Identify Farmer Willis.

"While he was choking me with the intention of killing me, the cat made a noise. I renewed my fight and shouted, 'There's my husband. There's Mr. Covell. Thank God.' My assailant immediately took fright and ran around to the back of the house."

Such is the statement made by Mrs. Covell, wife of Benjamin Covell, as to how, through the incident of the family cat jumping from a cupboard into a rocking chair, her life was saved, and the disgrace of a double murder was saved the people of Old Rodney Corners. The incident is tragic in its tense dently sought a refuge on top of the old-fashioned cupboard, which forms the chief furnishing of the simple sitting-room and kitchen combined, and when the death battle had been renewed with another quarry in the next room the cat, coming down from its place of retreat, jumped into a rocking chair, causing it to rock to and fro, making a noise of which the enfeebled old woman, to whom the prospects of dishonor and a brutal death had given new life, was quick to avail herself, and the cowardly brute, took fright and ran through the fields in his anxiety to put as great distance as possible between himself and the husband of the woman he was seeking to kill.

That the murderer and assaulter of one woman, and the attempted murderer and assaulter of another is no tramp, but is some with the vicinity and the people, is now pretty well agreed by all, drinking more than is good for him. Though only the local constable and St. Thomas police have as yet been working on the case, Provincial Detective Greer it is expected, will take the matter up today, and that an arrest will follow before very many hours is the belief of the majority of the people The motive for the crime was revealed in all its disgusting and abhorrent viciousness by the examination of the physicians, and it is thought that the robbing of the poverty-stricken old women was but a well-thoughtout scheme of the brute to throw a herring across the trail when the inevitable pursuit of the murderer began. With the motive revealed, and with the fact to work on that the man who committed the crime was acquainted with the names of those who lived in the community, as well as with the name of a Mary Taylor, now three years de ceased, and for whom he inquired when he entered the Covell home, there does not appear to be any room to doubt that it is only a matter of hours until the criminal is apprehended. The deliberate character of the brute is shown by the fact that he, before entering the Covell home, deliberately and coolly went to a cherry tree which grows close to the fence a couple of hundred yards from the scene of the murder, and cut the club with which he extinguished the life of Eliza Lowery. By a few people it is thought that the murderer had heard that Mr. Covell was home on Sunday night, and that he may have been under the impression that likely after pay day; but the general belief is that the robbing of the old women was merely a subterfuge, and that it was done merely to throw suspicion for the commission of the crime onto some outsider, probably a tramp. It is known, too, that a tramp spent the night in the village, but those who saw him say that his description does not at all tally with the description Mrs. Covell gives of her assailant.

In the light of matches which the murderer used in his efforts to locate her when she was hiding under the bed to save her life. Mrs. Covell saw her assailant's face, and she describes him as follows:

"A MAN ANYWHERE BETWEEN 25 AND 40 YEARS OF AGE, CLOSELY SHAVEN, HAIR CROPPED SHORT, THIN POINTED NOSE; IF ANY MUSTACHE, A VERY SMALL ONE, DARK COAT AND VEST; WORE AN OVERCOAT WHEN SHE FIRST SAW HIM OUTSIDE IN THE MOONLIGHT, BUT HAD CAST IT OFF WHEN HE APPEARED IN THE HOUSE; THINKS HE WORE A STIFF HAT, AND WAS VERY AC-TIVE AND SUPPLE.

As Eliza Lowery, the murdered woman, struck the murderer a vicious blow on the face with a chair when he was kicking Mrs. Covill, the police are looking for a man with a scar on his face, and this blow of the old woman's may result in the capture of the murderer.

The people of the vicinity are greatly incensed over the outrage and murder of Miss Lowery, and on every hand the opinion is expressed that the exercise of capital punishment is not sufficient for the crime.


