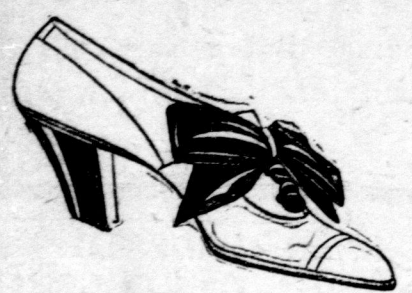

**D. OF E. WILL CHOOSE
A MONUMENT DESIGN**

Meeting Will Be Held in Y. M. C. A.
Building Saturday Afternoon.

A regular meeting of the Daugh-
ters of the Empire will be held to-
morrow afternoon at 2:30 in the Y. M.
C. A. building, when a design for the
soldiers' monument, which is to be
erected in Victoria Park, will be
chosen.

Some excellent designs have been
submitted, and there is no doubt that
a monument that will be a credit to
the city of London, and a worthy mem-
orial of those who gave up their
lives for the old flag, will be erected
by the Daughters of the Empire.

It has been a long and a tedious
struggle, but the ladies have suc-
ceeded in their goal, and work on the
monument will be begun shortly.

**PHYSICIANS LEAVE FOR
ENGLISH HOSPITALS**

A party composed of Dr. J. J.
Mason and wife, and Dr. J. W. Wright
and wife, of this city, left last even-
ing for London, England, where the
doctors intend studying for four
months in the hospitals there.

On Wednesday evening Dr. Wright
and Mason were very pleasantly sur-
prised by a number of their friends,
who gathered at the residence of Dr.
Wright, and presented both him and
Dr. Mason with purses containing
\$200 in gold.

The doctors were very much sur-
prised at receiving such tangible ex-
pressions of the goodwill of their
friends and thanked them in neat
speeches.

The remainder of the evening was
given over to a social time.

Mee Gets Five Years in Kingston Judge Scores Strathroy Embezzler

**Victim of Goodfellowship, De-
clares His Lordship—Pre-
vious Case Unclear.**

Herbert Mee, the Strathroy traveler,
who occupied the box with Noah,
and was convicted on eleven
counts of theft, or embezzlement of
the funds of the Strathroy Brewing
Company, was asked by Mr. Justice
Riddell, at the assizes this morning,
why sentence should not be passed.

In a weak tone of voice which was
not audible to his lordship, Mee asked
for mercy.

After delivering a scathing address,
in which he denounced severely trust-
ed employees who proved thieves, his
lordship sentenced Mee to five years
on each count in Kingston Peniten-
tiary. The sentences will run con-
currently.

A Previous Offense.
His lordship stated that he had re-
served sentence on Mee at the recent
assizes in order to make inquiry into
his past life. To his dismay he had
found that the prisoner had commit-
ted a similar offense in this city sev-
eral years ago.

Mee at that time was employed by
the Carling Brewing Company, and
embezzled several hundred dollars.

Sidewalks and Opening New Streets

The board of works will meet this
evening, when there will be several
important matters of business to be
transacted.

The opinion of City Solicitor Mer-
edith on the opening of new streets, less
than 66 feet wide, will be brought up.
Some time ago Ald. Rose brought up
this matter, and asked if the city could
not obtain legislation, making it com-
pulsory that all sidewalks on these
streets be laid uniformly. He pointed
out that several streets in the city had
been spoiled by the unevenness of the
sidewalks, and in addition, there had
been many suits for damages threat-
ened against the city.

Mr. Meredith, in his opinion, points
out that the matter is entirely in the
hands of the city engineer. The coun-
cil cannot be compelled to open such
streets, but they are opened on peti-
tion. When a street is opened, the
city council should make an agreement
with the petitioners that the sidewalks
may be direct. If the petitioners refuse
to do this, the council refuse to open the
street.

The Eva street sewer will also come
up. A strong deputation to oppose this
sewer will be present.

There are other important matters
coming up also.

**Scheme To Help Mission Movements
Brought Forth By Rev. Mr. Inkster**

**Presbyterian Council Indorses It
and Committee Appointed
To Carry It Out.**

The semi-annual meeting of the
Presbyterian Council was held last
evening in the lecture hall of New St.
James' Church with Rev. Dr. Ross, the
president, in the chair.

The attendance was particularly
large and several questions of im-
portance were dealt with.

Reports were received from each of
the newly-planted missions in the
city which are under the supervision
of the council. The financial condi-
tion of all of them was found to be
most encouraging and the regular
services to be gaining rapidly in point
of numbers.

Owing to the thriving state of the
Hamilton Road and Egerton Street
Mission the question of raising it to
an ordained charge was mooted. Rev.
James Rollins read an anonymous
letter which had come into his hands
advising that course, in view of the
circumstances. It was decided, how-
ever, that no hasty step shall be
taken in the matter, and it was re-
ferred back to King street session. In
the meantime, a suitable student
missionary will take charge during
the summer months. A committee
was instructed to see to the removal
of a slight debt which still rests upon
the church building.

Chelsea Green reported a balance

account and a reduction of their
mortgage.

A project was set on foot whereby
those living in the district north and
east of Wolsey Barracks may have
Sabbath services. Rev. T. H. Mit-
chell, already been established there,
a room having been provided, through
the kindness of Mr. W. W. Gammage.
It had five teachers and an increasing
number of scholars.

A Mission Proposal.
Rev. J. G. Inkster, of the First
Presbyterian Church, in making his
initial appearance in the council,
brought forward a very bold proposi-
tion by means of which the interest
of the city churches in missions, for-
eign and home, may be fostered be-
yond anything in the past.

He stated that the scheme which he
offered had been tried by churches in
England and Wales with marked suc-
cess.

The scheme calls for rousing ad-
dresses upon the different forms of
missionary enterprise on some Sab-
bath next November in all the Pres-
byterian Churches of the city. On
the evening following, a grand demon-
stration would be held in the body of
St. Andrew's Church, which would
be without example in the history of
the city. Splendid speakers would be
sought for, including Rev. J. A. Mac-
donald and Dr. H. P. MacKay, of
Toronto. A trained choir of one hun-
dred male voices would assist at the
united service.

Mr. Inkster was roundly ap-
plauded for his vigorous advocacy of
the scheme and the council proceeded
to elect the nucleus of a large com-
mittee which will finally be representa-
tive of all the churches to carry out
the proposal. Rev. J. G. Inkster, Rev.
T. H. Mitchell and Mr. C. R. Somer-
ville constituted their choice.

By private arrangement there will
be an interchange of pulpits during the
summer, when appropriate sermons
will be delivered in November.
Up to the demonstration in Novem-
ber the following officers were elected
for the coming year:
