The Young Men's Christian Asso- ciation of the city has just ended its year, and the members are planning extensively for the mass meeting to be held in the Opera House Sunday afternoon, when Dr. Ronald D. Grant, of New York city, will deliver the an- niversary address.

Dr. Grant is one of the most emi- nent speakers on the continent, and his reputation is international. For him the people of Portland, Oregon, built the famous White Temple at a cost of \$185,000.

Dr. Grant comes to the city espe- cially for this address. He has had ex- periences with the association in British Columbia, his former home, and throughout the United States, makes him a most acceptable speaker for the occasion.

The Y. M. C. A. with the experience of years has changed some of its methods, but it stands today as at its inception for the cultivation of a nor- mal, Christian life in men and boys, and for their enlistment and training in Christian service.

Very Successful.
This has been one of the most suc- cessful years in its history. The splendid support given in the financial campaign last fall, enabled the asso- ciation to broaden its field and under- take phases which heretofore have been left untouched, and it is a cred- itable thing that the association, when it is not fettered by financial matters, does an aggressive work.
