"Not only will we kill you like a dog, but every one of your children will be murdered," said one missive. The last one came to him only a week ago, a few days after the visit of Lima to Cincinnati. "You have your last chance," it said.

VANDERBILT'S COLDNESS CAUSED HER SUICIDE

Mrs. Ruiz' Once a Well-known Chorus Girl Takes Her Life in Old London.

New York, June 11.—Dispatches from London today tell of the suicide some days ago of Mme. Marie Agnes Ruiz, the divorced wife of Antonio Ruiz, a secretary of the Cuban legation at Washington, whose name was mentioned in connection with the divorce suit of Mrs. Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt.

Not much has ever been disclosed concerning the early history of Mrs. Ruiz, and it was not until her name was mentioned in the Vanderbilt case that much attention was attracted to her. There was a good deal of mystery regarding her origin then. So far as could be learned she was the daughter of a Missouri farmer, who, like a lot of other farmers' daughters, possessed of a good figure and good looks, had come to New York and gone on the stage.

She was Mary O'Brien when she came here but her appearance on the stage was made under the name of Ruth Hilton. While a chorus girl in a Broadway show in 1902 she attracted the attention of Ruiz, who was a young Cuban with a good deal of money and attached to the Cuban legation. The pair were married Aug. 17, 1902, and Ruiz and his bride sailed for Cuba. He introduced her to his friends in Havana, but before they returned here, and apparently Ruiz found his wife had been living under several names in different Broadway hotels before their marriage. After he discovered this the couple separated.

Attention was not again attracted to Mrs. Ruiz until shortly after the separation of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Vanderbilt. An automobile sales agent let it be known that Mrs. Ruiz had purchased an automobile of him costing \$11,000, or rather that it had been bought for her by Harry Brechney, who at that time was Vanderbilt's stable manager, and who subsequently eloped with Mrs. Alfred S. Dietrich. Brechney, the automobile agent said, had given him to understand that Vanderbilt would be responsible for payment of the \$11,000. She denied the story told by the automobile agent.

In the complaint filed by Mrs. Vanderbilt in her suit for divorce last year, she alleged that her husband had been guilty of misconduct with an "unknown woman" at Richmond, Va. At the trial Benedict Clarke testified to having met Mr. Vanderbilt in the company of a woman who was introduced to him as Mrs. Ruiz.

On the day the divorce decree was signed Mr. Vanderbilt went abroad, where he has spent most of his time. Mrs. Ruiz sailed for London a few months later, after the suit of her husband had been decided in her favor.

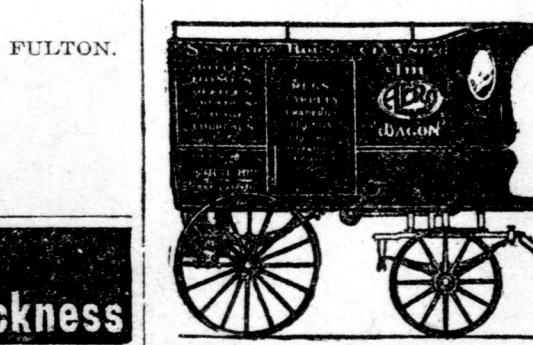
