Important amendments to the seed act and new legislation with regard to the use of weed seeds in feedstuffs are under way, and will be introduced in the House shortly. Mr. G. H. Other Means of Distribution. The Dominion commissioner, while admitting that the seed merchants

are partly responsible for the distribution of polluted seeds, is convinced that there are other ways in which weed seed is distributed. Tests made at experimental stations with a view to determining the characteristics germinating power of weed seed have convinced the department that the use of weed-infected grain for feed is one scurce of danger. Part of the new legislation will seek to lessen this danger.

Mr. Clarke is also carrying on quiet educational campaign to get Ontario farmers to take advantage of the provincial law dealing with seed evil. In an address before the biological section of the Canadian Institute last night, upon the subject of farm weeds, the seed commissioner. in telling of the work that the department was doing, referred to the necessity of the farmer doing something for

"I hope," he said, "that the farmers will see their way clear to do something for themselves, to make some effort to accomplish what they have so persistently demanded the

FLEET IS GROWING

During Year.

Ottawa, Nov. 22.-According to the marine department blue book, tabled in the Commons today, the total number of vessels on the register books of the Dominion at the close of last year was 7,768, measuring 718,530 tons, being an increase of 166 vessels and 16,229 tons as compared with 1908. The total value of the net registered tonnage of Canada is estimated at \$2,1556,590. The value of new vessels built during the year is estimated at \$1,138,770.

The number of Canadian vessels wrecked in foreign waters and foreign vessels wrecked in Canadian waters was, sea-going, 71 totally and 221 partly wrecked, involving the loss o thirteen lives and \$770,383. On the inland waters thirteen vessels were totally and thirty-eight partly wrecked. The loss was \$369,383, and eleven lives were lost.


