PLOWED UP SKULL

Remains of Unknown Man Found in Field Near Galt.

[Canadian Press.] Galt, Ont., May 21.—This morning one of the men employed on grading for the Lake Erie and Northern Railway made a gruesome discovery when his plow turned over the skull of a man. Further investigation revealed other bones, and practically a complete skeleton was gathered and reburied. The find was made on the farm of W. Taylor, within 20 feet of the river. Oldest residents can remember no burial here, and owing to the bones being so near the surface the theory advanced is that the body must have been washed ashore years ago during a flood time.
