LONDON AND DISTRICT

Miss Anthistle Assisted. — At a
reception held in St. Mary's on Wednesday

and Dr. H. A. Stevenson summoned

Bar Liquor From Cars. — Circulars
have been sent to all the railway mail
clerks by registered letter calling at-
tention to the fact that any of them
found under the influence of liquor or
with liquor in their cars are liable to
instant dismissal without chance of re-
instatement. The circulars have to be
signed by the clerks and sent back to
Ottawa.

Filed an Appearance. — The London
Street Railway filed an appearance
Thursday to the Charles Nicholas writ
under the company for damages. All
blame for the accident is placed on the
Grand Trunk, the street railway com-
pany, which requires that all trains stop
before crossing a line which is not pro-
tected by signals. The Grand Trunk and
the street railway are joint defendants in
the action for damages.

Two Writs. — George R. Hunt, on behalf
of his son, Harry Robert Hunt, a minor,
has issued a writ in the county court
against Mr. Thomas McKenna, of this
city, asking for unstated damages for
injuries received by the boy recently in
the factory of the defendant, McKenna.
Murphy & Galt represent the plaintiff.
John Hurley James has issued a writ in
the same court, asking that Frank Spe-
tigue, of Westminster Township, be re-
strained from selling eleven white hogs,
which the plaintiff alleges, Spettigue was
keeping to feed for the season.

Agricultural Courses. — The pro-
gram for the stock judging course at
Thorndale, Dec. 1 and 2, has been ar-
ranged by Mr. I. B. White, B. S. A.,
Middlesex agricultural expert. The
course will be given in the agricultur-
al building in the fair grounds. Mr. J.
M. McCallum, of Shakespeare, will lec-
ture on judging "Dairy Cattle," and
Mr. W. J. Gardhouse, Thistleton, on
"Beef Cattle." Monday, Dec. 1. The
second day Mr. Gardhouse will lecture
on judging sheep and heavy horses.
The course will be under the auspices
of the East Middlesex Farmers' Insti-
tute, the officers of which are Thomas
Ramsey, president, and James Wheat-
on, secretary, and the Farmers' Club,
the officer of which are James Ram-
sey, president, and Robert Hobbs,
secretary.

"PUBLIC" MEANS—WHAT?

Parks and Water Commission

Discuss Perplexing Problem
of the Boulevards.

Because of the legal interpretation
of one six-letter word the city of
London is faced by an unexpected ex-
penditure of \$2,500, and more as well
as the necessity for introducing by-
laws for the enactment of new clauses
in the 1914 City of London Bill. The
one word is "public." On the city
solicitor's opinion of the definition of
that word hinges the whole crux of
the boulevard question that is now
very much "up in the air." During the
past year \$2,500 and more has been
spent by the parks commission on the
city boulevards. According to the
city solicitor the parks commission
had not the legal authority for the
expenditure of this money, as the
boulevards are still under the juris-
diction of the city council, the opinion
of the council and commission to the
contrary notwithstanding.

What Does "Public" Mean.

In the city of London bill of 1912,
when the care of the parks was hand-
ed over to the water commission, it
was stated that the "public" boulevards
would come under the jurisdiction of
that commission. When the water
commission was formed by the
parliamentary act, the interpretation
placed on the word "public," by the
commission, was that it meant all
public buildings, and, therefore, the only
jurisdiction of the commission was over
such boulevards.

A Perplexing Question.

There has been considerable dis-
cussion over the perplexing question,
and Thursday night the members of
the parks commission and the board
of works held a joint conference. The
whole question was threshed out. At
its conclusion the city engineer was
asked by the board to secure from the
city solicitor his opinion.

Both commissioners and aldermen
were unanimous in their opinion that
the meaning taken from the act by
the city solicitor was never intended
when the act was drafted. Both com-
missioners and aldermen agreed that
the intention was to turn everything
over to the commissioners. To secure this
end, however, an amendment to the
act will have to be made in the next
city of London bill.

While this new legislation will be
sought for, another amendment will
be made, according to the commis-
sioners, and that is in the ap-
propriation that is allotted to them for
park purposes. At present one-half
mill is the limit of their yearly bud-
get. This will be insufficient to take
care of parks and boulevards, accord-
ing to their statements. Chairman B.
W. Bennett, of the board of works,
agreed with them.

"We should have at least a mill for
park purposes," said the chairman.
While reference was being made to
the appropriation another interesting
legal question was brought up. Chair-
man Pocock, of the water commission,
explained that an effort had been made
by the commission to pay the \$2,500
expended on tree trimming and boule-
vard care from the half-mill rate. The
city solicitor had ruled, however,
that the same regulations that barred
the commission from having legal care
of the boulevards would bar it from
paying out the half-mill, as that was
not legally intended for anything but
park and public boulevard purposes.

inson, and J. H. Saunders; City En-
gineer W. N. Ashplant, Chairman
Philip Pocock, of the water commis-
sion, Chairman W. Wyatt, of the com-
mission, Commissioners W. E.
Saunders, and E. B. Hamilton, and
General Manager H. J. Glauzitz.

BAD ROADS IMPERIL

CITY FIRE FIGHTERS

Chief Aitken Complains of the

Road on Ridout Street

South.

Thursday's meeting of the board of
works saw the usual batch of com-
plaints against the condition of the
city streets. They were varied, how-
ever, from the ordinary run. Fire
Chief John Aitken made a vigorous
plea for a better road on Ridout street
south, while G. A. Wenige notified the
board that unless Wharncliffe road
south were improved he would insti-
tute damages against the city.

The fire chief complained that from
Bruce street to the Ridout street bridge
the street was in a deplorable condi-
tion with holes and ruts. It was dan-
gerous, he said, for the fire apparatus
from No. 3 hall on Bruce street that
has to use Ridout street to get to the
down-town section every time an
alarm is turned in from the business
end of the city. As permanent pavements
are to be laid on both Wharncliffe road
and Ridout street next year, as soon
as the storm-water sewers are put
down, only temporary repairs will be
effected now.

H. E. Heath, who claimed damages
from the city, as a result of being
thrown from his motorcycle when a
piece of wire became entangled in its
spokes, will have to collect in the
courts. His claim was sent on to the
city solicitor for defence if suit was en-
gaged. The same treatment was ac-
corded a claim of Mike Tierney, who
claimed damages as a result of fall-
ing on Richmond street, due to an al-
leged faulty pavement.

Garbage Superintendent W. C. Dodd
presented a report that 22,000 collec-
tions of garbage and ashes were being
made weekly by the department.
His report stated that many objections
had been received, but as the depart-
ment routes had been reorganized, the
cause of complaints had been prac-
tically all removed.
