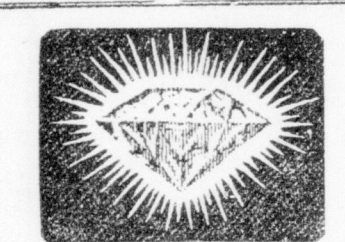

WESTERN FAIR PROSPECTS FOR 1916 BRIGHTER

Entries Far Ahead of 1915 Records to Date.

BIG SHOWING OF AUTOS
Overflow Accommodation Already Necessary for Motor Exhibit.

PATRIOTIC EXHIBITIONS
Shell-Making and "Made-in-Canada" Toys Will Be Featured.

Prospects are the Western Fair of 1916 will eclipse even the record-breaking success of a year ago. Secretary A. M. Hunt is responsible for this prophecy, or rather, information, which he has furnished.

Of course, the weather will be an important factor and while predicting the greatest Western Fair in the history of London the board leaves a loop-hole for itself with the proviso, "Weather permitting."

But the day after day of clear sunny weather during fair week a year ago did not by any means fully account for the great success. Exhibitors made possible the crowds, but could not be held responsible for the fact that the list of exhibitors and exhibits had never before been so long and that, indeed, it was necessary to provide for overflow in some departments with tents and other hastily improvised shelters.

Entries Exceed Those of 1915. As far as the exhibitors are concerned for this year the entries are ahead of last year at this time in practically all departments. Exhibitors haven't been taking any risks. Immediately after the close of the Western Fair a year ago they made up their minds to be early in the field this year. The result is that exhibitors are coming up to the Western Fair office every day now to find disappointment awaiting them. The early-comers naturally have picked up the choice locations and in some instances not an inch of space is left in the desired building.

This, for example, is true of the main building. In fact, with the exception of two buildings, the cement and one other, all available space has now been pre-empted.

Auto Exhibition Large. Mr. Hunt recalls the different conditions of a few years ago when about the end of August the directors were chasing around for exhibitors to take the space. Now, the tables have been completely turned. The automobile exhibit from present indications is to be a big feature of the fair.

Prospects are that the live stock exhibit will be large, especially of cattle. The sheep pens have been enlarged by the addition of 32 pens and all space in these has been taken. The entry of horses is much larger than at this time a year ago.

One of the most interesting buildings will be the new process building, where demonstrations will be given of the manufacture of a number of commodities.

Entries of women's work have come in well. A first-class ring program is promised and assurance is given that every item is "O. K." and "A. I."

Two bands a day are under contract to furnish music, and among the outside bands secured are the Galt Klitties and the Clinton Klitties.

An exhibit of great interest will be that of shells both completed and in the various stages of manufacture, the local manufacturers, F. E. Leonard & Sons, The London Gas Power Company, the London Machine Company, and the Empire Brass Works having consented to co-operate with the Fair Board. This exhibit will be on view in the main building.

Another exhibit with a specially patriotic significance, which it is hoped to secure, is the "Toy Fair," an exhibition of Canadian-made toys, similar to the one held in Toronto last spring. Mr. Hunt has conferred with Mr. Beebe in Toronto, secretary of the Canadian Toy Association, and also the deputy minister of trade and commerce, with the result, though the Toy Exhibition has been promised to the Ottawa Fair, it is probable the Western will get at least a part of the exhibit.

The grounds will be in good shape by Fair Week, and nearly all the buildings have been improved by a coat of paint.

Moving Offices Early. Profiting by experience of former years, Secretary A. M. Hunt has decided to take his full staff out to the administration building the Monday before the opening day of the fair, instead of waiting in the open air as formerly. From Monday, September 4, until after the Fair, the downtown office will be shut up as tight as the bars of the city after September 16. All business will receive attention from the administration building at Queen's Park, a saving of time for the Fair Board and staff and also for exhibitors and work people employed at the grounds.

Programs, the lists, etc., have been printed, and the badges are all ready for their wearers. The directors' badges are to be especially gorgeous, in crimson and gold, with the date 1916 printed on a celluloid medallion in a gilt frame.

The passes are ready for the directors, and accompanying each is a neat little morocco cardcase in black with the name of the director clearly printed in gold.

DRIVER'S STORY. Vincent Colgan, 564 Talbot street, owner and driver of the car, testified that he was driving slowly, about six miles an hour, on the south side of Dundas street, east of the intersection of the street with the right side, just to the south of the car tracks. He noticed the woman coming from the north side and heard the alarm.

As she got by the car she seemed to lose her head and turned about and faced the car, and the next instant appeared to jump backward right into the car before Colgan had a chance to turn to avoid an accident.

Questioned by Coroner MacLaren he stated that if Mrs. Tripp had not been in the car the accident would not have happened.

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JURY EXONERATES VINCENT COLGAN IN MRS. TRIPP'S DEATH

Recent Dundas Street Fatality Was Purely Accidental.

VICTIM WAS CONFUSED
Stepped in Front of Car and Gave Driver No Chance to Stop.

"That Mrs. L. J. Tripp came to her death at Victoria Hospital, city of London, on August 9, from injuries received on Dundas street at the Market Lane, by being run over by a motor car driven by one Vincent Colgan. From the evidence adduced by the various witnesses, we find that death was accidental, and we exonerate the driver of the said car from any blame in the said case."

The above verdict was rendered last evening by the coroner's jury called to determine the cause of death of Mrs. L. J. Tripp, who died as a result of injuries sustained after being struck by an auto driven by Vincent Colgan, of 564 Talbot street.

Became Confused. The accident occurred at noon on August 9 as Mrs. Tripp was about to cross Dundas street, the evidence of witnesses showing that she had evidently become confused when an auto coming from the east attracted her attention, when within a few feet of the one driven by Colgan, which came from the west.

The first hearing was held on August 14, when the evidence of all the witnesses was taken but one, who had not been summoned.

The inquest was then adjourned until Monday evening, August 21, to permit the witness to appear, but owing to an unavoidable circumstance at the time she was unable to be present, and the inquest was readjusted until last evening, when the case was finally closed.

Was Confused. Mrs. Margaret Purdon, the only witness called at the hearing last night, testified that she saw Mrs. Tripp, who was in front of Gray's, Limited, she had noticed the car driven by Colgan as it approached the Market Lane, coming up the south side of Dundas street. She saw Mrs. Tripp at the time start to cross the road, and just as she had about passed in front of the auto driven by Colgan, which was proceeding slowly, she noticed that the auto was stopped quickly after striking the woman.
