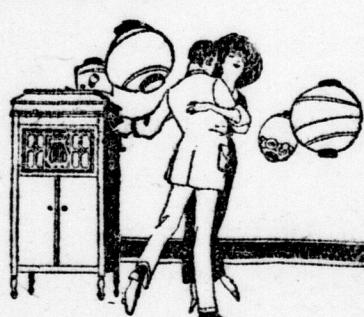

CARS STOP AT THE DOOR.

CANADA OUSTED OVER THOUSAND ALIEN ENEMIES

Spirited Them Away Quietly in Last Year, Says Col. Date.

100 FROM WINNIPEG

Deported Manitoba Reds—Kapusking Camp Has Only 100 Aliens Left.

MONTREAL, Jan. 19.—(By Canadian Press).—Lieut.-Col. W. E. Date, commandant of the camp for alien enemies at Kapuskasing, back here on full, stated today that, while United States newspapers had made much ado about a shipment of several hundred "reds" to Europe, the Canadian Government had been carrying on this work quietly but effectively for over a year past.

During the last year well over a thousand alien enemies had been shipped from Canada and more were yet to go. They included Austrians and Germans chiefly, with a certain number of Russians. These parties were sent under guard to Rotterdam or ports from which easy access could be secured to central European points. About one hundred of the Winnipeg "reds" had been thus deported, who had been gathered in during the trouble at Winnipeg last June by the Royal Northwest Mounted Police and sent in batches to Kapuskasing, whence they were shipped across the Atlantic.

Lieut.-Col. Date said there were only at present about one hundred alien enemies at Kapuskasing, together with a few hundred in camps in other parts of the country, who would be sent home at the earliest opportunity.

ACCLAMATION AT HULL. OTTAWA, Jan. 19.—Louis Cousineau was today elected mayor of Hull by acclamation.

DECIDES UPON FULL PROBE OF SIMS' CHARGES

U. S. Senate Naval Committee Announcement—Rathom Charges Up.

DANIELS' STATEMENT

Admits Clashes—Says Admiral Must Establish Every Criticism Made.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Complete investigation of Rear Admiral Sims' charges against the navy department's conduct of the war will be made by a sub-committee now inquiring into the award of the naval decorations as soon as it completes its present task. This decision was made today by the full Senate naval committee.

While refusing to discuss Admiral Sims' letter of criticism of the department, Mr. Daniels indicated the admiral frequently clashed with the department through his insistence that more destroyers be withdrawn from the troop convoys to augment the anti-submarine forces in European waters.

Unless the Senate investigation of Rear Admiral Sims' charges of failure of the navy department to co-operate fully with the Allies during the war is made by a naval board, Secretary Daniels announced today. He added that no organization in the history of the world ever did a better job than the American navy.

Probe Rathom Charges.

The committee also authorized appointment of another sub-committee to determine whether there should be an inquiry into the charges made by John R. Rathom, editor of the Providence (R. I.) Journal, with the knowledge of Secretary Daniels, "many seamen in the navy have been used for the purpose of entrapping innocent men."

Not Commander-in-Chief. Secretary Daniels emphasized that Admiral Sims was not commander-in-chief of the American naval forces overseas, and that throughout the war he was subordinate to Admiral Mayo, as commander of the Atlantic fleet, and to Admiral Benson, chief of naval operations. He said Admiral Sims was to make recommendations to the navy department, and then to obey the orders issued after those recommendations were considered.

Declaring that when all facts were laid bare the country would be proud of the navy, Mr. Daniels said, "When the smoke blows away," he continued, "I am confident that the American people will see that the navy administration has been efficient."

Death Wins in Race; Plane Arrives Late

Two Die From Poisoning Before Serum Comes.

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Death won a double victory in a grim race with an express train and a government mail aeroplane Saturday night, when two family members of the Paul Delbena family, poisoned by an attack of serum necessary to save their lives. Hospital physicians, however, made an injection in the arm of one of the children, 10 years old, the only surviving member of the family of seven, with serum received from Washington. This morning the physicians said they believed the serum had saved the girl's life.

SIR ADAM TO SAIL WITH LADY BECK IN ABOUT THIRTY DAYS

LONDON, Jan. 19.—(By Canadian Press).—Sir Adam and Lady Beck have left Bournemouth, where Sir Adam was in a nursing home, under an attack of pneumonia, and will sail for Canada, if the doctor permits, on the 18th of February.

INFLUENZA OF MILD TYPE HAS LOW DEATH RATE, SAYS REPORT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Although there was slight increase in the number of influenza cases, especially in the Chicago district reported today, officials said there was nothing alarming in the present situation.

The disease is of a mild type and with a low death rate, while the number of pneumonia cases resulting is small.

Officials of the service pointed out that as only about 1,000 cases throughout the country were reported last week, as compared with more than 4,000,000 cases a year ago, the spread of the disease has hardly reached a stage to cause anxiety.

FARMERS' AIMS AND TARIFF POLICY OF LIBERALS ARE SAME

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King Addresses Reform Club of Montreal.

MONTREAL, Jan. 19.—(By Canadian Press).—Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King paid his first visit to Montreal as the Liberal leader today, when he addressed a luncheon at the Reform Club at a special luncheon. Mr. King devoted much of his address to an account of his recent tour of the Maritime Provinces, and to a consideration of the farmers' movement throughout the Dominion, which he regarded as a species of Liberalism. He declared that there was no danger of a farmers' political movement in the Maritime Provinces, giving the view that the farmers were quite content with the political program of the Liberal party. As to Ontario and the West, it was his opinion that the movement there would in the end harmonize with the Liberal doctrine of the tariff and reciprocity with the United States.

He stated that owing to the pressure of work and the approach of another parliamentary session he had been compelled to postpone the original intention of making a tour of the West until after the conclusion of the next session.

Later in the afternoon Mr. King met the Women's Liberal Club and in the evening the Young Men's Liberal Club, leaving by the 10 o'clock train for Ottawa.

100,000 IMMIGRANTS CAME TO DOMINION IN LAST 8 MONTHS

Majority Came From England and United States.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Jan. 19.—In spite of the fact that the Government has tightened up its immigration restrictions and that only two classes of immigrants have been encouraged to enter, namely, agriculturists and household help, the movement to the Dominion during the first eight months of the current fiscal year has been very considerable and shows signs of improvement.

The financial qualification for artisan classes has just been increased, and each individual income of that avocation must have in his possession \$250 in cash with \$150 for every member of a family over 18 years of age. During the eight months of the present fiscal year a total of 84,450 immigrants came to Canada. Of these 47,485 came from Great Britain, including 36,513 English, 522 Welsh, 8,412 Scotch and 2,137 Irish. From the United States there came 36,721. At the present time these are really the only two countries from which immigration is being encouraged.

A considerable proportion of the British immigrants comprise recently wedded wives of members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, the classes which desire to come from Great Britain have largely been of the artisan and mechanic type and not agriculturists. From the United States have been coming in very large numbers men who have sold their lands at very high figures in the middle west states and who have brought large amounts of capital with them.

Artisans and Mechanics. In the future for after-war industry, it is expected that a considerable number of the artisan and mechanic class will come from the British Isles. Great Britain has been paying the fares to Canada of war workers who have come to Canada, and a committee of selection has had the matter in hand. Eight parties of female workers have already come.

NEWSPRINT DEADLOCK STILL CONTINUES

WINNIPEG, Jan. 19.—(By Canadian Press).—Again today Winnipeg is without daily newspapers and still depends for its information on current events upon the three dailies a result of the newprint shortage. The latest report from Fort Frances, Minn., indicates that the large paper mills there, which have insisted upon not shipping to Western Canada newspapers more than fifteen per cent of their total output, have not as yet resumed shipment of newspaper, and there are no signs of an early breaking of the deadlock.

ROBBERS MAKE HAUL IN KINGSTON STORE

KINGSTON, Jan. 19.—Robbers made a daring entrance into the house of Lieut. Granger, storekeeper at Portmouth, yesterday afternoon and took between two and three hundred dollars in cash. The money was in a dresser drawer, which contained also checks of considerable value, but these were not touched, nor was anything else in the room meddled with.

Lieut. Granger, who is a returned soldier, started in business only a short time ago.

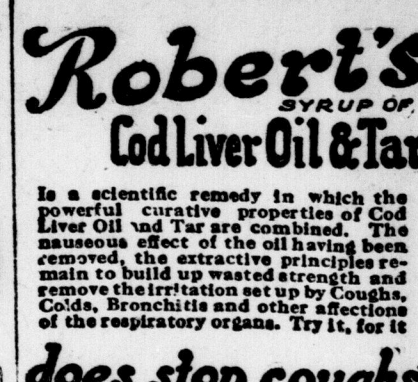
NUMBER ON PAYROLLS SHOWS DECREASE

OTTAWA, Jan. 19.—(By Canadian Press).—Reports from 4,553 firms for the week ending December 27, showed 640,619 persons on payrolls as compared with 653,369 for the previous week, a decrease of 12,750 persons, according to the report of the employment service of Canada, labor department.

Ottawa was chief among the provinces registering declines in the amount of employment. All groups with the exception of railway operations reported decreases in staffs, the declines being largely attributable to curtailment of staffs with the close of the holiday season, and the beginning of the usual stock-taking and inventory period.

GOLD SHIPMENT OF \$10,000,000 IN COIN REACHES NEW YORK

NEW YORK, N.Y., Jan. 19.—Gold coin, valued at \$10,000,000, has arrived here from Canada during the past few days, it was announced today. This is probably the balance of \$20,000,000 in gold that the Dominion Government announced would be sent to this country to meet some obligations, and partly to remedy depreciation in Canadian exchange. The first half of the shipment arrived on December 13 and 14.

The power shortage during the winter months is greatly increased by the overlapping of lighting and power loads, and also at times on account of the blocking by ice of the water supply to the generating plants.

The commission are asking the co-operation of every hydro user, whether domestic or industrial, to assist in conserving power and light in every possible way in order that an uninterrupted service may be maintained until a further supply of power is obtained for this system.
