

TWO MINE SURVIVORS FEAR VIOLENCE

Twelve Wounded Men Want Protection Before Leaving Hospital.

Mystery of Missing Nineteen Still Unsolved At Herrin, Ill.

Washington, June 27.—Realizing that the deadlock existing between mine operators and union mine workers will not voluntarily be broken by either party to the coal strike, the administration was prepared today to offer a plan for negotiating the differences which, it was believed, could not be rejected by either party to the strike.

Herrin, Ill., June 27.—Removal to safety from "bloody" Williamson County and the Southern Illinois coal fields of wounded non-union men now in the hospital, in the wake of last Thursday's mine massacres. Twelve wounded survivors of the forty-seven guards and workers, who were sent on the death march out of the Lester strip mine, are lying on their hospital cots, their wounds swathed in bandages. Some of the wounded say they sense danger, and express fear of further violence if they leave the hospital unprotected.

to be rapidly deteriorating. City Engineer H. A. Brazier has announced his intention of closing it to pedestrian traffic in the near future.

Used by Hundreds.
This bridge was purchased from the Traction Company along with a portion of the right-of-way of this railway when it ceased operation, and is several hundred feet in length. The portion formerly utilized for the railway cars has been allowed to fall into disuse, but a foot bridge at one side, maintained by the city, is used by hundreds of residents of South London daily.

The nearest bridges across the south branch of the river on either side are those at Wellington and Ridout streets and the Traction bridge serves materially as a short cut for South Londoners to the downtown section of the city.

It is understood that the timbers in the bridge, which are about fifteen years old, are becoming decayed, and are a menace to the safety of those who travel on the bridge. For this reason the bridge will be closed by the city engineer this summer.

The bridge proper over the river is of steel construction, but several hundred feet of trestle work connects it with Carfrae Crescent, and it is this section that is to be pronounced unsafe.

WOULD GIVE LABOR SPENDING POWER

Frederick Jowett Addresses Opening Session of British Convention.

Edinburgh, Scotland, June 27.—In his presidential address to the 22nd annual conference of the British Labor Party, which opened here this morning, Frederick W. Jowett said the party not only stood for self-determination for Ireland, India and Egypt, but it also desired to relate these claims to the economic facts so that the world might profit. He said the steady economic pressure at home, caused partly by the loss of foreign trade, had produced stagnation.

Mr. Jowett declared that capitalism, more powerful than ever, was using its power to destroy the defenses of organized labor. He denounced the high rates of interest on the country's debts and the wasteful extravagance of the wealthy at race meetings and royal functions.

BRITISH EMPIRE STEEL CO. ELECTS DIRECTORS' BOARD

Adjourned Annual Meeting of Shareholders Held Tuesday in Montreal.

Montreal, June 27.—The adjourned annual meeting of the shareholders of the British Empire Steel Corporation and its subsidiary companies was held here this morning. The president, referred to the meeting several weeks ago for the purpose of permitting further discussion on the subject of the corporation's new financing plans. These plans, he said, have not yet been completed. Despite rumors of important changes in the directorate, including the appointment of two or three prominent business men to executive positions, no announcement in connection with this was made.

De Gaulle, Frank Rees, W. D. Gross, H. B. Smith, R. M. Stewart, G. L. Stone, Benj. Talbot, J. P., and R. M. Wolvin. The above names constitute the first permanent board since the incorporation of the company less than a year ago.

Mr. Baldwin, accompanied by his wife and daughter, had only returned from a three months' visit in Europe on Monday morning.

FINDS DELORME UNFIT FOR TRIAL

Dr. Bellefeuille Presents Technical Evidence At Montreal Hearing.

Declares Accused Does Not Realize Gravity of His Position.

TUBERCULIN TESTS TO BE MADE SOON

Arrival of Dominion Veterinary Expected by Health Officer.

Following a request forwarded to the federal government by the Board of Health at its last meeting, urging immediate action, Dr. W. S. Downham, medical officer of health for London states that a government veterinary will arrive in this city soon to conduct tuberculin tests on herds of cows which supply milk for London homes.

The tuberculin test is a means of detecting the presence of tuberculosis in cattle, and serves as a protection to milk consumers.

"After the inspector has gone over the herds, all dairies supplying milk to London will be divided into two classes," said Dr. Downham. "The first class or class A will consist of those herds which have been tested and found free from tuberculosis."

"The other class or class B will consist of those herds which the owners refuse to have tested, and whose milk will have to be pasteurized before being offered for sale here. The people would sooner have raw milk free from tuberculosis than the pasteurized variety, and therefore dairies in class A will be in the greatest favor."

It is understood that the staff of the veterinary surgeon-general at Ottawa is depleted at present, which explains the delay in arrival of an inspector at London. Need of the tuberculin test is urgent in this district in order to protect patients at Victoria Hospital and Byron Sanatorium, who are kept largely on milk diet.

PROPOSE GERMANY TO BUILD CHANNEL TUNNEL

French Minister of Public Works Submits Plan For Reparation Commission.

Paris, June 27.—A huge war reparations plan under which the Germans would reconstruct France and also build the long planned tunnel under the English Channel, has been submitted by the minister of public works, M. Le Troquer, Premier Poincare, who has laid it before the French member of the reparations commission.

The plan involves the use of German labor and materials to the extent of twenty billions of francs. The newspapers, publishing the details, approve the project, declaring that Germany cannot refuse to pay. They say if she is able to carry on the construction of railways and telegraph lines in Germany she is able to reconstruct the war-torn areas in France and also to help build the canals, electric power plants and railways, which are needed in France and which are now under partial construction.

WILL ATTEMPT TO PROVE LIGHTS ON

Now at liberty under bail to the extent of \$2,000, Leo LaFortune will appear before Justice W. H. Chittick in county police court Wednesday morning to answer a charge that through negligence while in charge of an automobile, he crashed into another car and severely injured one of the occupants.

LaFortune claims that the fault was not his alone, and will bring several witnesses into court, he asserts, to back his statements. He claims that he was driving with both headlights burning contrary to the charge of the authorities. He will be defended by Judd & Henderson, attorneys.

MINER KILLED AT BRIDGEPORT, OHIO

Bridgeport, O., June 27.—One miner was killed and another wounded this morning when they were fired upon from the hills while en route to work at the strip mine owned by the Catharine Coal Mining Company at Uniontown, near here, according to information reaching here. The victims were in an automobile when the shooting began.

The shooting occurred near LaFortune, Belmont County. There were six miners in the automobile, but four escaped without injury. According to reports to the authorities here, the firing began without warning and lasted only a few moments. The assailants escaped.

QUIZES MERCHANTS BANK CASE

Toronto, June 27.—Whether there will be any further proceedings in the Merchants Bank case was the question put by T. L. Church of Toronto in the House of Commons this morning. "I know of nothing further than is now in the courts," replied the minister of finance.

Wants Leek Blazoned In Canada's Armorial Bearings

OTTAWA, June 27.—That the leek should be included in the Canadian coat-of-arms as the national symbol of Wales, was the request made in the House early this morning by John Evans, Progressive member for Saskatoon.

"The symbols of four of the greatest races of the world, the English, Scotch, Irish and French, have been included," he said, "but the leek of my native Wales, which gives its name to the heir to the throne, has been omitted."

Premier King promised consideration to Mr. Evans' request, at which the House laughed heartily.

CITIZENS RUSH TO AVOID FINES BY FILING RETURNS

Heeds Warning Of Assessment Commissioner Grant—Court Action Impends.

Warned by publication in The Advertiser that Assessment Commissioner Stephen Grant would prosecute for failure to file income tax returns, still more delinquents in this regard turned in the necessary information.

Mr. Grant states that several citizens who ignored notification to file income tax returns have done so since the publication of threatened police court proceedings, but several more who have neglected to do so will be summoned.

"The returns of those who delayed filing them are coming in nicely now," said the assessment commissioner Tuesday, "but not sufficient to boast about. We will summons to court those who persist in ignoring the warning."

"It has been suggested that the names of the delinquents be published, but that might not be right. Any of those who have not yet received assessment notices should let us know, and we will send them notices."

Mr. Grant points out that there is a penalty of ten dollars a day for delay in filing income tax returns. There are about ninety citizens liable to this penalty, the majority of whom are assessed in ward one.

DR. HILL, LONDON, SPEAKS AT SARATOGA CONFERENCE

Addresses Annual Gathering Of N. Y. State Health Officers At Opening.

Dr. H. W. Hill, dean of the faculty of public health of Western University, and director of the Institute of Public Health here, delivered an address to the New York State health officers and public health nurses, whose annual conference opened at Saratoga Tuesday.

Dr. Hill's address was given on the opening day, and the conference will continue Wednesday and Thursday. Dr. Hermann M. Biggs, state commissioner of health for New York, is directing the conference, which was opened by an address delivered by Governor Nathan L. Miller.

Many other noted public health experts will deliver addresses at the conference, and selection of Dr. Hill to take his place on the program with these specialists is regarded as a tribute to his ability and an honor to London and Western University.

DOES NOT BELIEVE SCHOOL SITE CAN BE PURCHASED

Alderman States That Owners of Trafalgar Street Property Do Not Wish to Sell.

While deploring the fact that but little or nothing has been done by the board of education this year to provide further school accommodation in Southeast London, Ald. Gordon B. Drake expressed the belief Tuesday that in any event the trustees would not be able to purchase a second site for a public school as suggested in place of the Dakin street location.

The councillor explained that he now understood that the owners of the new site in question, on Trafalgar street, did not wish to sell their property at this time. He feels, however, that the school trustees would be exercising poor judgment should they persist in their original intention to construct a new edifice at Dakin and Price streets.

OLD RESIDENT OF DORCHESTER DIES

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SHIP NOTORIOUS WYOMING CAR

Officers Leave For Detroit With Alleged Property of Insurance Company.

McMullen Is Safeguarded From Loss by \$3,000 Bond.

Bearing Ontario license number 69-561, the Oldsmobile touring car in which Edward A. McMullen, alleged Wyoming bandit, was riding when arrested, and which he claims as his property, leaves Tuesday afternoon for Detroit, Michigan, in charge of American officers.

The machine is claimed by the Mercantile Insurance Company, the attorneys here for which concern that the car was stolen soon after manufacture, from in front of the Motor Sales Company, Flint, Michigan. The insurance company paid the cost of the machine, and now claims the machine as theirs.

A bond of more than \$3,000 has been furnished to safeguard the interests of McMullen, who, while now awaiting trial in the Lambton County jail for alleged complicity in the Wyoming bank robbery of October last, claims, through his counsel, McEvoy and Judd, that he purchased the machine from a reputable garage in Toronto.

As it has been definitely established that a McLaughlin master six was employed by the Wyoming bandits, there is no claim by the authorities that the contested machine was used in the robbery.
