PARIS, Sept. 25.—George Carpentier, knocked out by Battling Siki yesterday afternoon and deprived of his title as heavyweight champion of Europe by the unexpected victory of the hardy Senegalese, was keeping to his bed today, battered and discouraged and watched over by his trainers.

His manager, Francois Descamps, is already out, howover, for a return match with the victorious African.

"It's all his fault. It's a good lesson for Georges," Descamps said this afternoon. If Carpentier had not tried to play with Siki he would not have been hit in the third round by the lucky punch that dazed him.

Carpentier is blamed severely by all the sporting writers for taking the fight as a joke. They remarked that the ex-champion seemed to think he had nothing to do but play to the gallery for the benefit of the moving-picture men, and that he could "get" Siki when he wished.

None of the writers suggest, however, that Carpentier could whip Siki in a return match, for they recognize the fact that the Senegalese battler can apparently take unlimited punishment. Many of them, nevertheless, express the opinion that Carpentier could have finished the fight a victor in the first or second rounds yesterday, when Siki impressed them as beling in a frightened condition. Now, they feel, his confidence would carry him through.

Press Favors London Manage r For Job — Economy May Force Local Club To G et Playing Manager

The resignation of Clarence Rowland, manager of the Columbus, American Association team, and the fact that Buzz Wetzel, manager of the London Mint League team, is being boosted for the job by both newspapers of that city lends added weight to the rumors current about the city that Buzz would not be back again in this league next year.

Unofficially, there is claimed a loss of over \$4,500 for the local club on the season's operations, and this also makes Buzz's return more problematical than ever, as a playing manager would be a big saving to the club, and again Buzz's reputation for grabbing off pennants brings him a plumper figure than most managers in this class of ball draw at the end of the

The fans would be sorry to see Buzz go, and the officials of the club probably won't let him get away if it's possible to retain his services. However, the decision will lie mostly in Buzz's hands. Buzz, human-like, is looking for promotion, both financially and to a higher league, and if he should cop off the helm of the Columbus club he would be realizing both aims and taking a big step toward both these aims and to his main ambition—a major league berth.

The casual observer will hardly credit that the club lost anything like the amount credited to it in the rumors flying about. If they did, and in the face of attendance figures elsewhere, the Mint League would be an awful wreck. However, there is no doubt that the takings were consider ably decreased contrasted with the receipts of 1921, especially when the sale of players is taken into consideration. At least an even break would almost be credited for the 1922 season.


