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DUKE AND DUCHESS OF MARLBOROUGH.

Shall the church or state rule in England in the matter of divorce? The Anglican Church, which has official status here, forbids the remarriage of divorced persons.

The civil authorities permit such remarriage. Both civil and church heads today are demanding a showdown on the question and the Duke of Marlborough, former husband of Consuelo Vanderbilt, is the center of the unique tilt.

It all started when Consuelo divorced Marlborough. Marlborough then married Miss Gladys Deacon, also an American heiress.

The Bishop of Oxford immediately declared Marlborough could not be a communicant of the Church of England and barred him from attending the Oxford Diocesan Conference of which Marlborough is a member by hereditary right.

Marlborough, though he cared little about the right of attending the conference, was nettled when he was barred. He's now demanding that the church recognize him as a communicant.

Marlborough and his friends maintain that the Church of England, which is supported by the state, is refusing to recognize laws passed by the state and especially laws passed by parliament, in the upper house of which bishops of the Established Church sit as hereditary legislators.

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Harding Will Discuss Prohibition with Cabinet

Secretary Mellon Admits Inability to Enforce Existing "Dry" Laws in U. S.

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Secretary Denby, who has threatened an investigation into alleged drinking by Annapolis midshipmen at the Army-Navy game last Saturday, will probably go over the situation with the other cabinet officials.

Government officials claim the present situation cannot continue. Secretary Mellon believes it would take an army to enforce the present statute strictly. In fact, he is inclined to believe that strict enforcement is impossible, and he has no plan to tighten up on the current violations.

FEDERAL CHARITY DRIVE NETS TOTAL OF \$410,000

Montreal, Nov. 23.—E. W. Beatty, chairman of the Financial Federation of Charities, announced last night that the campaign which has been in progress the past week, has passed its objective of \$350,000, and as reported to date had slightly exceeded \$400,000. Senator Lorne C. Webster said later that with figures yet to be reported the total result would be close to \$410,000. Over 40,000 people had subscribed.

SCHOONER DRIVEN ON ROCKS DURING STORM

Booth Bay Harbor, Me., Nov. 23.—The Nova Scotia three-masted schooner Barbara W., loaded with fertilizer and bound to Wolfville, N. S., from Boston, was caught in a snowsquall and driven on the rocks off Southport early today. Captain Tower and his crew reached shore with the assistance of coast guardsmen. The schooner sank soon after they had abandoned her.

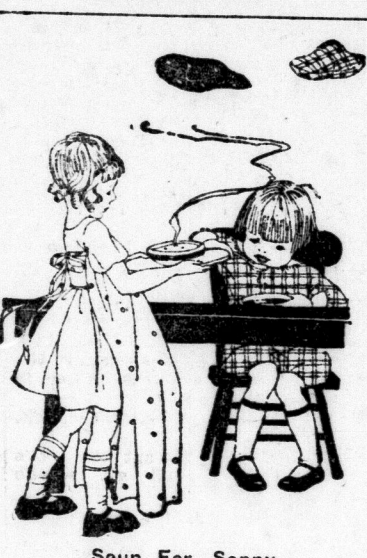

OTTAWA ADVISES COAL SUBSTITUTE

Committee Suggests Householders Secure 30 Per Cent Other Fuel.

The advisability of securing some form of coal substitute is revealed in a statement issued by the federal advisory fuel committee in Ottawa, Tuesday morning, in which they recommend that every householder should obtain a supply of coal substitute equal to at least 30 per cent of their usual coal order.

It will be the middle of February, they say, before the shortage of anthracite can be made up, a time when transportation difficulties are at their worst, and they advise bituminous coal and coke as the best and most efficient substitute.

Local coal dealers today confirmed this report, in fact as a whole they seem to think that the committee has taken a conservative view of the situation, and that even more than 30 per cent of coal substituted may be needed during the winter.

The public in the past has been a little shy of substitutes, in the opinion of some of the dealers, and there has been a difficulty in getting them to accept them, with the result that coal merchants have hesitated to load up with coke and bituminous. This year, however, they see the necessity of these two heat producers in the coal shortage, and are up to the usual standard of comfort. They reinforce the warning issued by the fuel committee, and advise all those who can to accept a reasonable amount of one of these substitutes.

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
