# **VARSITY HONORS LONDON WOMAN**

Miss Caroline MacDonald Receives Degree of Doctor of Laws.

Miss Caroline MacDonld, daughter of the late Peter MacDonald, former postmaster of this city, was highly honored by the University of Toronto, her alma mater, last week, when the degree of doctor of laws was conferred upon her, Miss MacDonald, who is effgaged in important work among the prisons of Tokio, Japan, is the first woman to receive such a distinction from the university.

Principal Maurice Hutton, acting president of the university, in conferring the degree, referred to the fact that Miss MacDonald was the first woman to be so honored.

"If any follow her they will not win it in a field more honorable or more feminine." she said. "She has won the right to be here by her life.

Miss MacDonald embarked for Japan 21 years ago, where she spent ten years as national Y. W. C. A. secten years as national Y. W. C. A. secretary in Tokio. Later she undertook the much more difficult task of ministering to the needs of men confined to prison. Her magnificent work in this connection has given her an important place among missionary heroes, has won for her recognition of the Japanese people and their emperor, and now brings an honor from her own university. 


