New York, N. Y., July 20.—The Cincinnati Reds have been playing at a percentage rating of .800 and better since the 1st of July, while the Giants in the same period have been going only at a .500 clip. The Reds are playing super-championship baseball, and super-championship baseball is the kind that wins pennants.

The Giants, ever since the loss of Bancroft at shortstop, have not. Nothing in the National League race has been of much significance and means so much as the bolt of the Cinnati's this month, and even eastern clubs seem to have overlooked it up to this time, the Giants stood so high and had been going so fast. Bancroft III. Bancroft played shortstop for the New York club in Boston on June 28, but since then he has been trying to recover from inciplent preumonia. He has been absent from the team, and in his place is Jackson, a youngster who gives promise of being far better than gives promise of being far better than he is at the moment, and who has been playing every bit as well as could be expected from a boy who lacks experience. His physical qualifications are good, but he is not Bancroft on an infield that needed Bancroft.

this writing only a game or two separates the Reds from the lead, and the Giants, lacking defence, cannot cope with the remainder of their league since pitchers are not doing as well as of Cincinnati club.

A Sorry Showing.

After Bancroft was forced to inactivity the Glants won a game with Boston and lost one. Brooklyn defeated them in a single game. They won three from Philadelphia, but if the Phillies had not been in their usual comatose state the Giants today would be in second place. That's the most significant fact of all, for it shows on what dangerous ground the champions are treading. The Reds trimmed the Giants 2 to 1, but the New York club won the Pittsburg series 3 to 2, and repeated this with Chicago. The St. Louis series now holds the stage.

At the end of May the Giants were leading the league with over .700 percentage. The last of June saw them over .680, which is better than standard championship baseball. No one knows what they will be at the close of July, but mid-July is past and they are hovering around .625. And the Reds are liways progressing even though they neet occasional reverses.


