Threats were made against Rossa's life, and it was said that his immediate friends had determined to form a bodyguard to protect him.

Sho t came to this country with the man who in the summer of 1832 shot at Jim McDernott in Captain Ryan's barroom in Chambers street. He is said to be a native of Cork; where he was one of the principal leaders of the movement directed by Rossa. A long interview in the Kansas City Journal was published by Phelan lately. It is said that in June, 1883, Phelan started on a voyage to Ireland. His absence was made notable from the fact that during his sojourn in Ireland, Carcy, the informer. alias Powers, was shot by Patrick O'Dennell. THE SCHEME AGREED TO BY THE

Victoria Accepts It and Others Talk It Over -Only One University for the Province-How, the Institution is to be

HEADS OF COLLEGES.

Province—How, the Institution is to be Managed.

1. It is proposed to form a confederation of colleges, carrying on, in Toronto, work embraced in the arts curriculum of the provincial university, and in connection therewith the following institutions, namely: Queen's university, Victoria university, and Trinity university, Knox college, St. Michael's correct. Wyeliffe college, and Toronto haptist o'lege, shall have the right to enter into the process of confederation, provided always in the school of practical science, and in such of such institutions shall, so long as a remains in the confederation, here in abeyonce any powers it may powers it may powers of forming degrees of the than degree in the school of practical science, and in such of the powers it may p

peal any of the provisions of affiliation of institutions as contained in R, S. O., cap 210, sec. 61.

2. The shead of each confederating college shall be ex officio a member of the senate of the provincial university, and in addition thereto the governing body of each confederating college shall be entitled to appoint one other member of the senate. The university professoriate shall be represented by two of their members on the senate, and the council of University college by one of its members in addition to the president.

3. The undergraduates of any confederating university shall be admitted ad curden statum, and the graduates in law and arts of any confederating university shall be admitted ad cundem gra um in the provincial university. Such of the graduates in medicine of any confederating university as shall have notually passed their examinations within the limits of the province of Ontario shall be admitted ad cundem gradum in the provincial university.
