SKING POPULAR FOR THE EASTER HOLIDAY

OTTAWA, April 2.—Easter Monday in the capital finds old man winter still going strong. Four inches of snow fell early on Saturday. Yesterday was clear and cold, and to-day another fair-sized snowstorm is in progress. Up to 8 o'clock the fall registered over two inches and the sky was still very much overcast.

To-day is another idle day in the civil service and sking, which has gained many hundreds of new devotees this winter, will again be the most popular holiday sport.

The temperature in this city last month was over five degrees below the average for March and the snowfall was exceptionally heavy, according to the local weather report just issued. March 9 was the coldest on record, the temperature being 12.5 degrees below zero. The heaviest snowfall was on March 12, when there were 5.1 inches of snow. The maximum temperature in the month was 48 degrees, as compared with a maximum of 56 degrees last year.

ENGLISH COURTS CLEAR SLATE BEFORE EASTER

LONDON, April 2.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—Judges and law clerks generally rose for the Easter holidays well pleased with themselves especially because of the fact that practically every branch of the judiciary has caught up with the arrears of business, which used to be considerable.

Litigation, owing to the decline of industry is not as heavy as formerly, which accounts partly for the arrears having been overtaken, but improvements in the administration of justice are also responsible in a measure.

A probable consequence is that no successor is likely to be appointed to the late Justice Bray.

The divorce court, which used to have enormous arrears of business, has risen almost abreast of its work. There is a continuous decline in the number of such cases, although the number is still far above the pre-war level. The high proportion of childless marriages which finish in this court has repeatedly been a subject of comment. The military services provide the largest number of applicants.
