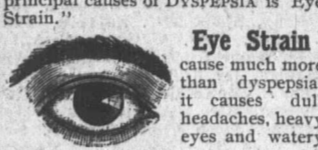

Moving Grain Crop
Enormous Capital is Invested in Rolling Stock
The average grain crop in the Canadian northwest is somewhere around 200,000,000 bushels, of which nearly 25 per cent, or say 50,000,000 would be required for local consumption and seed. To move the balance of this crop at one and the same time, figuring roughly 1,000 bushels per car would require 150,000 box cars.
These cars cost at present about \$1,000 each; or if any such supply were a fact it would represent an expenditure of \$150,000,000, which is an obvious impossibility for any railroad or group of railroads.
In the early years of development in the northwest, however, only the most limited facilities have been provided for storing grain. As the country develops such storage room is bound to increase and consequently the clamor for rolling stock for immediate shipment will be less urgent, even though the total acreage under cultivation, and the consequent yield is greatly increased. This, according to a Grand Trunk traffic official, will be quite as much to the advantage of the farmers as the railroads, inasmuch as it will enable them to hold their grain for higher prices instead of being obliged to dump the entire crop on the market as rapidly as it can be moved.
In connection with the above figures perhaps twenty-five per cent, or 50,000,000 would remain in the country for local consumption and seed.
