Municipalities Invest Hydro Surplus in Victory Bonds

Many rural municipalities which have benefited by hydro development are now giving their surplus prosperity to help along with the Victory Loan, as a number of communications have been received of late by the Hydro Commission from municipalities at scattered points asking the Commission if they might be permitted to invest their Hydro surplus in the bonds. Investigation by the Commission of the finances of the municipalities heard from shows that they have a surplus aggregating practically \$250,000, and the Commission is now advising that it be invested in the bonds. All the municipalities concerned are quite small, with populations around the two-hundred mark, and this, in addition to reflecting a generally healthy financial condition among the smaller centres, shows just what can be done by the Hydro.

Crimes go Home to Roost

Germany enjoyed “economic freedom” before the war. She had perfect access to British markets. She excluded our goods by high tariffs, while we admitted her goods free; and she laughed at us and hated us for our generosity. We admitted her shipping free to our ports; we admitted it free to the coaling stations of the Empire; and the result was Lieut. Frobenius' book—one of the deeper causes of the war—which jealously denounced us for daring to possess these ports, Germany had a privileged position. She had economically conquered the world by espionage and trickery. In the industrial and commercial sphere she was as stupendously strong as in the military field. She threw all this away when she wantonly made war for plunder. “We willed this war,” said Herr Harden in 1914, when her treachery seemed to promise magnificent results. Now Germany must suffer for it. For crimes, like chickens and curses, come home to roost.

Teachers and Traps

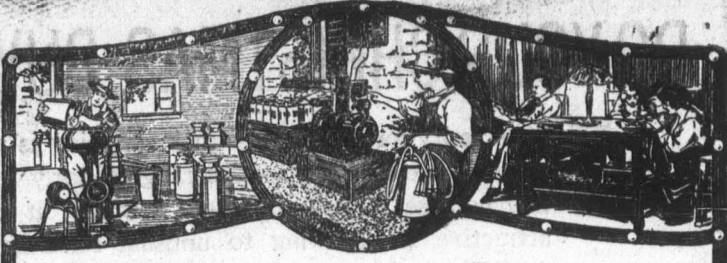
