ACADIA COLLEGE HALL DESTROYED

The Big Building With all its Contents Soon Reduced to Ashes—Loss \$100,000

WOLFVILLE, N. S., Dec 2—Acadia College Hall, one of the central buildings of Acadia University, and used as the administrative office of the institution was completely destroyed by fire which broke out shortly before midnight. The fire was first discovered by a student passing through the grounds. Efforts to remove the furniture did not avail much and many valuable records were destroyed, including the irreplaceable oil paintings of all the past Presidents of the University.

The fire was one of the most spectacular ever witnessed in this part of Nova Scotia, fortunately there was no wind, else there would have been grave danger of the wooden walls of the large structure, and poured forth in a mass of crackling flame rising to a great height, lighting the heavens and reflecting its ruddy light over miles of the valley and intervals.

VOLUNTEERS WORKED HARD Every effort was made to save the building, there was plenty of water, and the fire brigade, assisted by hundreds of willing volunteers fought in vain to keep the fire within the small compass of its origin. The only means by which it is thought the fire could have originated was by the blowing out of one of the furnaces. There had been people in the building earlier in the evening, and the first evidence of trouble was the fire and smoke issuing from the first floor.

The College Hall was one of the oldest buildings of the University. It was one of the few wooden structures left to the institution which is rapidly developing and modernizing its plant.

LOSS OVER \$100,000 The fire is supposed to have originated over the furnace and it made rapid headway. The German air plane presented by the Canadian Government to the University, one hundred rifles belonging to the Boy Scouts, all the treasures in the Museum, together with the furnishings and a fine collection of stuffed birds, the property of Robt Tufts, were destroyed.

The building was erected in 1879 and cost \$80,000. The insurance amounts to about \$40,000. It is estimated that the property loss will be over \$100,000.

At one thirty o'clock this morning there was only the smouldering ruins of the building remaining. At one time it was thought that the fire would extend to the Seminary but fortunately this did not occur. President Cullen is at present in Boston and is not expected home before Friday.

Chipman Hall was burned in 1913 and the Academy in 1915.

MANY NEWSPAPERS SUSPEND

This is "open season" for publications, and many of them are being shot to pieces.

Last week the Canadian Courier made an assignment, and will cease publication.

It was a Mackenzie & Mann publication, run very largely by Wm. Moore an associate of the railway magnates. A few weeks ago the Canadian Farm, another of their publications, was sold to the owners of the Toronto Saturday Night.

Last week also saw the suspension of the Hamilton Morning Times after a short career of three days.

The cost of publication is extremely high and a great many papers throughout the country are passing out of existence.

FIRE DAMAGES PAPER

Concord, N. H., Nov. 30—The plant of the Concord Daily Patriot was heavily damaged by fire which virtually destroyed White's Opera House block early today. The bulk of the loss, estimated at \$150,000, was sustained by Edward J. Gallagher publisher.



BEQUESTS \$80,000 TO SANATORIUM

Acadia University Will Also Receive \$6,000 From Estate of Mrs. James C. Jordan.

MONCTON, N. B., Dec 6th—By the will of Mrs. Jeanette A. Jordan, widow of James C. Jordan, of San Francisco, the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium at River Glade, N. B., is left over \$80,000.

According to the law of the State of California any bequest to a charitable institution outside of the United States must be contained in a will dated at least thirty days before the death of the party, making the will, otherwise it is void. Mrs. Jordan's will, in which New Brunswick is so much interested, was made twenty six days only before her death and as it stands the bequest to the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium rests solely upon the good will of the other residuary legatees, namely Marion Jordan Bantick Smith and Helen Jordan Baker, daughters of the late James C. Jordan.

But it is understood that these parties are favorably disposed towards carrying out the words of the will, irrespective of the date. If things work out this way, Jordan Sanatorium will be a beneficiary to the extent of one third the residuary estate, which is reckoned at about a quarter of a million.

Acadia University received \$6,000 and the income from an investment of \$8,000 is to pay the salary of the Baptist Minister at The Glades.

The residue to be divided equally between Helen Jordan Baker, Marion Jordan Bantick Smith and the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium executors, Frank P. Deering, San Francisco, as to the estate outside of Canada, and Clifford W. Robinson, as to the estate in Canada.

Mrs. Jordan's death occurred recently in San Francisco. Mrs. Jordan had been philanthropically disposed towards her native Province, having established Jordan Memorial Sanatorium at River Glade and shortly before her death conveyed the same to the New Brunswick Government.
