The great annual festival among some savages takes place in November, for three days, our til Halloweve, All Saints and All souls being fessil memorials of it on our calendar. The Pleiades then are visible all night long i. e, they rise at samet, culminate or cross the Meridian (called thing," as they are then due South.) at manight and set at suprise. In some places this testival takes place a little earlier, whon these stars are that seed in the evening i. e. October. They continue wisible at that time, rising however earlier and emiler will in February they culminate at sunset, and set at midnight; and about the first May they set a sunset and therefore become invisible. For 40 days their " arcutation " takes place, they them suppear above the eastern horizon at early dawn. Hence is Polynesia the year is divided very generally into two seasons, "the Pleindes above," and "the Pleindes below;" the first is from May to November, when those stars are invisible in the twilight; and the second is from Novembero May when these stars continue visible at that time. Among some races these two divisions se transferred to February and August, when those stars culminate at sunset and surrise respectfuly. There are two other times during which some rices hold festivals, viz; when these stars rappear: and also in July, when the stars in the Belt of thion and perhaps Sirius, almost in the same time, are all visible above the horizon at early morning.

Hence these dates are, 1st. in the middle of November, (or in October occasionnally); 2nd. towards the end of February; 3rd, about May 1st or early in June. 4th, about the end of August

or beginning of September (occasionally also in July.)

B - A Feast of the Dead in commemoration of ancestors and deceased relatives, generally takes place at the time of new years festival. It lasts three days and is generally held at most harming at some It is considered. at night, beginning at sumer. It is sometimes also a sort of thankgiving or harvest home; and the new fire is then kindled. Among some American rares there is such a festival held every 8 or 9 years, and regulated by the Pleisdes. The dead are removed then to the tribal burial place, and these already buried there are taken up and wrapped in fresh fura.

These feasts are secompanied by bon fires, games and sham fight.
