

DOMESTIC NEWS.

The daughters of temperance of Hamilton gave a grand Supper on Wednesday the 9th instant, the Rev. Mr. Ormiston addressed the meeting. A man by the name of Archibald McTaggart was frozen to death last week in Thorah. He was a steady temperate man. Much distress is experienced in California for the want of provisions, and similar distress prevails in the Australian mines. Sacramento, lately destroyed by fire is now inundated with water from the mountains. News of the date 8th Dec say a revolution had broken out in Buenos Ayres. An unfortunate fire occurred a week since at Thornhill. Mr. Clapham's house took fire, and his servant girl was burnt to death, and his wife badly burnt. Late news say Santa Anna was on his way to Mexico. English news say Mr. Gladstone is re-elected for Oxford. From China late news state that the rebels against the present Emperor had been worsted and were unsuccessful. From India reports say the English are going to annex another slice of India to their present territory, they must not complain of Brother Jonathan. The American Minister, Mr. Ingersoll, dined lately with the principal merchants of Birmingham. The Bank of England now charge 3 per cent interest. The New York Tribune speaks unfavorably of the coming of Kossuth to America; if he had been successful how glorious a fellow he would have been. The Illinois Legislature are about to pass a good prohibitory liquor law, a friend has sent us a draft of the bill, it is a stringent one. It is said the French Emperor is suffering from an incurable disease. The Paris and Galt papers are filled with an account of a death of a young woman, named Bethel Bennet, caused by attempting to bring on abortion. She had been the victim of some seducer there.

A public dinner was given to Col. Prince two weeks ago in Essex. The people of the city are agitating the question of cutting a canal through the end of the Island that separates the harbour from Lake Ontario, a very feasible thing; a meeting has been held on the subject. Mr. Dodds, of St. John's Ward, not being qualified, has given way to Mr. Leach. The Anniversary of the Typographical Society came off on the 15th instant. The despatch from the present British Ministry leaves the Canadian Legislature to deal with the Clergy Reserve question as they may think proper, but at the same time very improperly gives an uncalled for opinion as to the manner of their disposal. If the Lower Canadian members are now true to their professed opinions, and Upper Canadians do their duty, this vexed question will be equitably settled. Let us all unite to place religion upon its just basis, that is, leave it to the respective congregations of each church to support their ministers; certainly if man prizes Christianity there is liberality enough in every community to pay sufficiently well those who devote their time to preaching the gospel. Let every church be viewed with an impartial eye by Government, and work out its own progress without Government aid and interference.

FOREIGN NEWS.

Parisian circles are all a live with the frivolous gossip about Napoleon's wife, a Spanish countess of doubtful character. It is said she is about 25, very masculine and intelligent, a second Lola Montes. Quite an excitement was created at Dover in England by the sudden arrival of a French war steamer, that put into the port for water. It was proposed by the people at one time to call out the Militia. The officers were afterwards invited on shore by the British officers to dine. Accounts of persecutions and cruelties to the Italian patriots and Protestants are rife in Europe. Breadstuffs are rather declining. The 40th Regiment, which sailed from Cork last July in her Majesty's Steamer Vulcan for Australia, had not reached that country in due time. Vessels which left Australia long after the Vulcan should have arrived, give no account of her arrival. Much anxiety is felt in England on the subject. The English are carrying on the Burmese war upon a very small scale. Late news say that the Russians meet with continual defeats from the Circassians. Mr. Davis, of Massachusetts has introduced a Bill into the American Congress to regulate the American Fisheries. It seems many other Protestants besides the Madiai are imprisoned in Italy. In Havana a line of telegraph wires stretching over the island was being erected. A bill to establish reciprocal free trade with Canada, has been introduced into Congress by Mr. Seymour. It is said an amnesty on an extensive scale will be proclaimed in France after the marriage of Napoleon.

Parliamentary News.—Parliament opened again at Quebec on the 14th instant. The first news we hear of their proceedings are, that Mr. Brown had moved that copies of all correspondence between the Canadian Government and Mr. Jackson concerning the Great Trunk Railroad be laid before Parliament. A long and spirited discussion arose on the Government refusing to give the information required. It seems to us very strange if all behind the curtains is fair or honest why the ministry should wish to conceal any thing. We cannot comprehend this mystery. Certainly the country has a right to know all that affects its interests. Rolph and Cameron too of the present ministry condemned the Baldwin ministry for refusing to give the country useful information. One cannot help but think there must be something concealed which would expose Mr. Hincks. On this ground we condemn our city Council for covering up the £10,000 job of this city. Honesty does not fear to be uncovered. Next we find Mr. Ridout asking for information respecting the removal of the seat of Government to this city, asking

what steps had been taken to effect the same. It is understood that Government are about to commence building the necessary government buildings.

Since writing the above, we see Mr. Hincks has denied that any correspondence about a contract took place between Mr. Jackson and the government.
