THE TENTH SESSION OF QUEEN'S COL-LEGE.

WILL begin on the FIRST WEDNESDAY which date all INTRANTS and REGULAR STUDENTS in the FACULTY OF ARTS,

are requested to be present. The DIVINITY CLASSES will be opened on the FIRST WEDNESDAY in NOVEMBER. Candidates for MATRICULATION, as regu-

lar students, will undergo an examination before the College Senate in the first three books of the Encid of Virgil, the first three books of the Ecomentaries, Mair's Introduction, the Greek Grammar, and Arithmetic as far as Vulgar and Decimal Fractions, inclusive.

The only charges are £1, to cover incidental expenses, and £2 for each class per session, to be paid on entrance.

Accommodation will be provided for Students as Boarders, the expense to each boarder aver-aging about 7 dollars per month. Students intending to avail themselves of this accommodation, will require to bring their own bedding. The Boarding Establishment will be under the superintendence of the Professors.

All Students must produce a Certificate of moral and religious character from the ministers of the Congregations to which they respectively belong.

A number of Scholarships will be swarded at the commencement of the Session. The Scholarship for Students of the first year, will be conferred on those who display the greatest proficiency in the subjects of examination for matriculation together with the first Book of Euclid. For Students of previous years the subjects of examination for Scholarships, will be the studies of former Sessions.

'I he preparatory department or college school, Will be conducted as usual, under the charge of competent masters. The Fees in this Department are as follows :

All fees payable quarterly in advance. A de-duction of 25 per cent. is allowed on the Tuition A defees of parents sending more than one scholar.
