TO THE MEMORY OF A CANADIAN HERO.

Major-General Sir Isaac Brock with 382 British, 362 Canadian, and 650 Indian soldiers, captured a force of more than 2,500 United States soldiers at Detroit, on 16th of August, 1812, and that after firing but a few rounds of artillery ammunition. On October 13th, while leading an attack on a party of United States soldiers who had gained Queenston Heights on the Niagara frontier, he was shot through the breast and passed away with a cheer on his lips. His troops were repulsed, but later on in the day the invaders were defeated and some 900 prisoners and a stand of colours were captured. This monument, the tribute of a grateful country, stands on Queenston Heights, not far from the spot where this noble soldier fell.
