PRESENTATION OF PRIZES.

There was a public presentation of prizes to the winners of the first three places in each match. This took place on Friday afternoon, on the range, at the entrance to the council tent. The Minister of Militia, Sir A. P. Caron, presided, and made the presentations. He also made a brief speech, congratulating the riflemen on the success of the meeting and the increased attendance.

Amongst other distinguished personages present were Sir John Macdonald and Major-General Sir Fred. Middleton. Sir John being called upon for a speech received an ovation upon rising. He first expressed the pleasure which he felt at being present upon the occasion. He was glad, he said, to know that the position of the military service of Canada was most satisfactory. He had occasion to know from communications he had had with the military authorities in England that they looked upon the force in Canada as a great addition to the strength of the military force of the whole empire. He was gratified to note that the spirit which led to the adoption of the volunteer system had been so developed. They could make a good show in the field, and if the mother country was attacked they would be prepared to send an efficient body of men from Canada ready to fight for the old flag. There were many good shots in Canada, and he was sure they would make a good many bull's-eyes at the enemy if they had the chance. (Laughter.) The premier concluded by a congratulation on the success of the meeting.

THE LIST FOR WIMBLEDON.

The team of twenty to represent Canada at Wimbledon in 1888 will be chosen by the executive committee of the Dominion Rifle Association, from the sixty competitors in the Governor-General's match, their places on the list being determined by the totals of their scores in this match and in the "grand aggregate" combined. It will be noticed that three of the sixty are officers on the retired list, and they are therefore not eligible for the team. Their totals are given with the rest, but on account of their ineligibility they are not numbered:—
