around the red ring to make the roundel more readily visible against the camouflage paint of fighter aircraft. On bomber aircraft, such as the Lancasters and Halifaxes, the customary white circle was deleted because it was easily seen in the glare of enemy searchlights and the roundel was only a red circle surrounded by a blue ring. Later in the Far East and in the Aleutians the roundel on R.C.A.F. aircraft consisted of a blue circle surrounded by a white ring.

- (a) In 1946 the air council, presided over by the Minister of National Defence for Air, approved that the red circle in the roundel insignia be replaced by a red maple leaf and this was effected later that year. By virtue of the Aeronautics Act, the Minister of National Defence, subject to the governor general in council, is authorized to make provision for the proper identification of military aircraft. Within these terms of reference it became policy for the maple leaf in the roundel insignia to be identical in pattern to the maple leaf in the armorial bearings of Canada depicted on the Canadian flag which also is displayed on R.C.A.F. aircraft. Following the adoption of the new Canadian flag the design of the maple leaf in the roundel markings was altered to conform to that in the flag.
- (b) Recently air transport command, with the approval of the chief of defence staff, has been experimenting with a roundel consisting of a red ring around a red maple leaf on a white field and a few aircraft carry this marking. No decision, however, has been reached with respect to a change in the official roundel insignia.
