development opportunities between different regions. They also point out that the goal of the agreement stated by the Prime Minister was to secure guaranteed access to the United States market, and that that goal has failed. Therefore, the petitioners request that Parliament dissolve and allow the people of Canada the opportunity to accept or reject this proposed trade agreement during a national general election.

IRRADIATION OF FOOD

Mr. Elliott Hardey (Kent): Mr. Speaker, it is my privilege to rise and present petitions from the people of Chatham and Kent County. Approximately 600 people have attached signatures to these petitions, which have been properly certified for presentation.

The petitioners humbly pray that food irradiation not become part of food processing in this country, and that unbiased agencies and scientists complete studies of the safety of consuming food that has been irradiated. In the event that any food irradiation is permitted, it should be clearly labelled "treated with ionizing radiation".

NATIONAL FILM BOARD—BILLY BISHOP FILM
