Dear Professor Stanley.

I have just had a conversation with Mr. George Currie and Mr. Fisher with reference to the magazine, and George intends, I know, to write to you. You will remember our several conversations last winter with reference to your assuming, at my request, additional responsibilities here. I have not given up that idea, and I look forward to the time when I can bring such an arrangement into being. I hesitate now solely on the ground of not being able to afford it. This means that the matter must stand as it is at present. I have, though, asked that your salary for next year as Professor of Classics be increased by \$500.
