My dear Carleton,-

I hope you are well and that things go smoothly. I have been in Montreal twice recently but only for the day and have had no opportunity of seeing you. I hope to be there in the near future for longer and to see you.

At the suggestion of Mr. Riddell, one of the Board of the Trafalgar Institute, I went last night to see Miss Cumming, who had expressed the desire to consult with me regarding a proposal to acquire the Ogilvie property adjacent to the school premises. I imagine the reason Miss Cumming wanted to see me is that with the exception of Sweezey, who is busy with other things, I am the only member of the Board with daughters of tender years to educate, and I think perhaps she imagined that I had more interest in her work than some of the others.
