

Passing up the river on this palatial steamer from the town of

St. John's with its ever extending trade, fine hotels, manufactories, etc., and its many attractions and amusements. we pass on the left the barracks which are new built upon the site of the old fort which had stood so many attacks. About half-a-mile further on we see the earthworks, thrown up by Montgomery in 1775, and a creek, emptying into the river here, still bears the name of "Montgomery's Creek."

Sabrevois, a pretty little village on the left bank of the river is next passed, when we come to

St. Paul de Isle aux Noix, which has already established a favorable reputation as a pleasant summer resort. A fine commodious hotel stands close to the river, and good hunting, fishing and boating can be had, while close by is an excellent bathing place with sloping, sandy beach.

Isle aux Noix. This unparalleled spot for excursions and picnics is reached soon after. The massive buildings are full of interest, and many romantic tales of adventures are told of the period when this island was occupied with troops. Its velvety sward, grand old shade trees and lovely position make it an ideal spot for a summer excursion. Several prettily wooded islands
