feature of the late weakness. It was also noticed that primary receipts were three times as large as a year ago, 617,000 bushels, against 217,000 bushels. Nebraska especially was cffering wheat here freely.

Heavy offerings from cash concepns that are unable to sell to the east or to local industries pulled down corn after the market had touched a newhigh level for the season. Good local speculative buying caused the early advance.


