power of taxation. I do not mention the right of taxation, for of what consequence is that to this kingdom, unless it be exerted? You may talk, harangue, and swagger about it, as much as you please; but if you cannot, or dare not, enforce it, I will be bold to say, that it is ideal and visionary, and that you give up the substance, whilst you grasp at a mere shadow.

I have not patience with those gentlemen, who, through their ignorance of human nature, or an untimely timidity of disposition, talk of ascertaining the right of taxation, and yet are for repealing the Stamp-Act. Such a scheme as this is impossible, in the very nature of things; and to attempt it will be giving up both the right and the power, in as clear a manner, as facts are more express, and indisputable, than words. Is it credible that the Colonists will submit to any future imposition; when they have found, by joyful experience, that they have nothing to do, but to . rise up in arms, and oppose violence to legal authority? No !---they will infalli-
