WOMAN ALONE IN HOME WAS BURNED TO DEATH

Mrs. Annie Daw Victim of Mysterious Fire—Question of Street Lighting.

HAMILTON, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—Mrs. Annie Daw, 65 years of age, a widow living at 67 West Pictou-street, was burned to death in a fire of unknown origin in her home about 2:30 this afternoon.

The fire was discovered by a boarder, Fred James, who was returning from work. He turned on an alarm and the auto truck from Central fire station reached the scene in two minutes.

When the firemen entered the house the body of Mrs. Daw was found lying face down on the kitchen floor. Her hands and feet were burned completely.

GERMAN LOANS NOT RENEWED.

BERLIN, Jan. 23.—(Can. Press.)—Despatches from New York, stating that the German banks had renewed the loans amounting to \$70,000,000, placed in New York, are described by bankers here as being incorrect. It is a large reduction from regular prices and also that large amounts borrowed in marks have been notified for payment January 31. The bankers estimate that the remnant of American loans then remaining to Germany will amount to \$50,000,000 marks at the maximum, about \$15,000,000.


