NEW CERTIFICATE
WHEN DISCHARGED

King Has Approved Special
Document to Be Issued to
Warrant Officers.

Ottawa, April 24.—His Majesty the
King has approved of the issue of a
special certificate designated "The
King's Certificate on Discharge" to
members of the naval and marine
forces (including the Canadian naval
service), who have been discharged on
account of disablement during the
present war.
The certificate will be awarded to:
(a) Warrant officers of the royal
navy, Canadian naval service, royal
marine gunners, warrant officers of
the royal marines, petty officers, non-
commissioned officers and men of the
naval and marine forces who have
served at sea or abroad; or as pilots
or trained observers in connection with
aerial coast patrol work since August
4, 1914, and have been discharged for
wounds or sickness attributable to or
aggravated by naval service, provided
their disablement or ill-health was not
due to misconduct.
(b) Warrant officers of the royal
navy, Canadian naval service, royal
marine gunners, warrant officers of
the royal marines, petty officers, non-
commissioned officers and men of the
naval and marine forces who, not be-
ing included under the provisions of
paragraph (a) above, have been dis-
charged on account of disablement di-
rectly attributable to the action of the
enemy; e.g., zeppelin, aeroplane, naval
or military raid; or caused or aggra-
vated by service on flying duty in
connection with operations against the
enemy.

DELAYED GERMANS

Disposition of Airdromes En-
abled Offensive Against
Enemy Advance.

His Majesty has also approved of
the award of a special distinction to
members of the naval and marine
forces who, after qualifying for the
award of "the King's certificate on dis-
charge," have voluntarily re-entered
again for active service and are again
discharged for disablement. This special
distinction, which will be designat-
ed "the King's second certificate on dis-
charge," will be awarded under the
same conditions as laid down for
"the King's certificate on discharge" in
paragraphs (a) and (b) above.
Warrant officers and men who have
served only in shore establishments or
harbor ships are not eligible for this
certificate, except under the condi-
tions of clause (b).
The issue of certificates to warrant
officers and men discharged from the
Canadian naval service will be made
by the department of the naval ser-
vice, Ottawa. Applications should be
addressed to the secretary, department
of the naval service, Ottawa, with the
words "King's certificate" in the lower
corner of the envelope, and in the
case of men should be accompa-
nied by the service certificate of the
applicant.

BRYCE HAS SCHEME
TO REFORM LORDS

Would Have New Upper
House Nominated by
Politicians.

London, April 24.—The report of
Lord Bryce's committee on the re-
form of the house of lords recom-
mends that the house consist of two
sections, one of 246 persons selected
by panels, distributed in geographical
groups, and the other to consist of
persons chosen by a joint standing
committee of both house of parlia-
ment. The number of these persons
is recommended to be about one-
fourth of the whole second chamber,
excluding members ex-officio. The
committee's report carried with it a
majority of one, Earl Loreburn, Baron
Sydenham and Thomas Scallan, a
member of the house of commons,
dissenting.
The report also recommends that
the term of office for members of the
second chamber shall be 12 years,
one-third of the members retiring
every fourth year and their places be-
ing filled by election. The salaries of
the members shall be the same as for
those holding seats in the house of
commons, if it is decided that they
shall be paid. The second chamber
will not have the power to amend or
reject financial bills passed by the
house of commons. When a disagree-
ment arises over a bill between the
two chambers, the measure may be
referred to a conference of 30 mem-
bers from both houses and this con-
ference shall report unanimously to
both houses.

ALLIED AIR SERVICE
DELAYED GERMANS

Disposition of Airdromes En-
abled Offensive Against
Enemy Advance.

French Headquarters, April 24.—In
the recent battle our airmen were as-
signed a new role. Our high command
had foreseen that the enemy's advance
would follow the roads leading towards
Amiens and consequently airdromes
of battle actions were so distributed
so as to flank and not face the line
of the enemy's progress. Immediate-
ly battle was engaged our air squad-
rons not merely reported the move-
ments but delayed them by attacking
troops and trains.
During the first two days of the bat-
tle line presented activity, but on
March 22 the German army moved
over air battles yet fought. The Ger-
man air service was thought to have
been defeated and until March 29 we
had been unchallenged mastery of the air.
For a week the German army was
without eyes or ears. On the latter
day Baron Von Richthofen's squadron
appeared on the battlefield, but it was
then too late. The delay which the
air service caused the Germans meant
hours of invaluable time.
